BRECKLAND LOCAL PLAN UPDATE

Following the last update in July's edition, Breckland's Local Plan has now entered its next formal consultation stage, known as Regulation 18. The draft Local Plan at this point includes a wide range of draft policies for the whole district, along with the sites that Breckland Council has deemed to be their "preferred" sites for new housing.

As expected, North Elmham is now to accommodate more new houses than was the case before the general election, as central government has increased the number of new houses to be allocated within the new Local Plan from 625 units per year to 903 to be built per year. North Elmham's number has increased from about 50 new houses during the life of the Local Plan, which runs until 2042, to the new figure of 80 new houses.

The two preferred sites are as shown on the map, marked as NEL 1 for 30 new houses and NEL 2 for 50 new houses. The other sites put forward as potential sites for new housing have now been categorised as either "alternative" sites or "discounted" sites. It is possible one or more of the former could become preferred sites, most likely if one or both of the currently preferred sites were taken out of the Plan, while it is highly unlikely that any of the discounted sites would be included in this Local Plan.

You will also see from the map that three areas of green space have been included in the draft Plan as "Local Green Spaces", which will give them better protection from potential future development.

The public consultation opened on 31st October and runs until 15th December 2025: if you wish to have a say on any aspect of the draft Local Plan and its sites for housing allocations this is the time to do so. Once sites are allocated, it is very unlikely that the subsequent planning application(s) would be refused permission, so it is important to engage with the process at this stage.

The Parish Council will be submitting comments to the consultation following its December meeting.

CHURCH WALLS FULLY RESTORED

It is wonderful to report that after we have all been looking at crumbling and peeling plaster in the church for years, we can now feel proud of it all again. The walls are now all clean and white. But it has been quite a task.

We first had to sort out the rainwater drains along the north wall which were failing badly making the north wall very damp. As the walls started to dry out, we hacked off all the crumbling plaster and applied three layers of slaked lime. The first two coats were mixed with sharp sand and goat's hair, as required under good conservation practice. Then we put on a topcoat of slaked lime and fine sand. After three weeks that had dried out enough to put on seven (yes seven!) coats of limewash.

Job done up to full conservation standard, and it looks great!

25 YEAR CAREER WITH THE YHA

One or two villagers have asked if we could do some more articles on our up and down career with the YHA and we thought we might throw something together in the New Year, perhaps from Eileen's point of view as well. It was then suggested there could be a festive story. So here we are again.

Generally, because we had our own two children, we did not open at Christmas, especially when they were younger. Usually opening our hostels at Christmas was voluntary, and we had to put forward a plan of the event to ensure that there was variety between the different festivities. Whilst we were managers of St Briavels Castle, such a plan was easy to draw up and so we held Christmas festivities on a few years. We tried to deck the Castle as would be appropriate in medieval times, i.e., no tinsel and flashing lights. We each year went on a looting expedition to our previous hostel, at Welsh Bicknor. As some of you may recall. Welsh Bicknor had 25 acres of woodland, ideal for supplying us with a carload of holly, ivy, laurel and yew. All, we felt, in keeping with the medieval theme, and all, I have to say, with the permission of the managers. We slow cooked slices of orange and lemon, along with flour and water patties in various shapes. The overall effect, though I say it as shouldn't, was impressive.

I know, turkey was out of keeping but imagine the complaints if we hadn't. Which is why we did the banquet on Boxing Day. The secret of Christmas events is to feed everybody most of the time and entertain them for

the rest. One of the best decisions we made was to give a member of our staff the job of "entertainment director". He organised all sorts of games, walks etc., taking the pressure of the rest of the staff (including us).

One Christmas it actually snowed, which was magical. Guests did not stray far from the 3 large log fires we had. One of customers kept walking round offering shots of "cognac", though it was actually a Spanish brandy, but very welcome just the same. Another had booked a room in a nearby hotel and went around suggesting to any of the ladies, including staff members, that they could join him there. The room was unused that Christmas.

In the New Year, the Castle had to be de-decorated. One year Eileen was stripping foliage from the stairway, when she spotted a model of a robin in the ivy. She thought "I don't remember that". Then it blinked. It was a real bird that had somehow got into the building, and was just sitting there, presumably awaiting rescue, which was immediately forthcoming. Who says Christmas has lost its magic?

RECIPE

Melt in the Mouth Chicken

Ingredients

4 boneless chicken breasts

1 cup of mayonnaise (or Greek yoghurt)

½ cup Parmesan cheese

1 teaspoon of salt

½ teaspoon black pepper

1 teaspoon garlic powder.

Method

In a bowl combine mayonnaise, cheese and seasoning. Spread the mixture over top of each chicken breast.

Place chicken into a slightly greased baking dish and bake in a preheated oven at 180C for about 45 minutes or until cooked through.

I think you could experiment with different types of herbs, instead of the garlic powder, maybe tarragon or as I am doing today trying dried wild garlic.

AN ARCHIVE WALK THROUGH THE VILLAGE

There was a wonderful turn out for the History Walk on Sunday 2nd November, which was led by our local historian, Susanna Wade Martins. Thank goodness the weather was kind and so many people came.

We began at the telephone box at the back entrance to Elmham Park and walked up to the pound where stray animals were herded inside the four brick walls of the

Pound until their owners could afford to pay the money to get them released. After the Enclosure Act of 1830, commoners' livestock were restricted to the roadside verges. The Pound was built in 1830 and in recent years has been restored.

Then we went back up the hill, until we reached the bend in the road with Nelson House on the right. I have a postcard of the shop which had been a draper's shop run by Mr Adford (son called Nelson Adford). The name derives from the fact that for a while the shop was run by Nelson's brother, Suckling Nelson as a drapers' shop.

Standing facing you between Nelson House and its neighbour is a high brick wall blocking off the route of the old road that went through the park. The road was closed in to extend the park and the curving wall with the new lodge house was built in the 1840s.

Coming down the hill there was a row of 18th century cottages known as Coffin Row. They were condemned and pulled down when a communal Council House for the elderly was built there at the end of the 1930s. This was demolished in the late 1990s, and Breckland developed the site with houses.

At the bottom of the hill there was a small shop which originally had been a fish and chip shop. This was run by Mr and Mrs Shailes and was now selling basic foodstuffs and sweets. The shop was open from early in the morning until late in the evening.

Then we reached the village school, two doors opening onto the pavement with "Boys" over the top of one door and "Girls" over the other one. The words are still there today!

Does anyone remember? we would love to hear from you.

As we looked along the road with our backs to the school there was a row of three-storey dwellings- the front looking much more impressive than the backs and they were condemned before they were modernised. Our school cleaner lived in one of these when I was at Primary School in the 50s. A little wooden building at the end of the row was where Mr Runcie the Barber cut the hair for everyone in the village. He also worked at County School cutting the boys' hair. When my father had a haircut there, I always wanted to watch, but Mr Runcie made me stand outside and wait!

The walk continued past the 1960s housing development, and what is now the Teapost, but was originally the main village shop and down Eastgate where we had a welcome cup of tea at the Eastgate Centre (originally a Methodist Chapel) and admired a fine display of photographs from the Village Archive. Then the more stalwart members of the group walked on to the site of the old railway station which had been a busy place in the early years of the last century.

Further walks are planned for next year.

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 8TH OCTOBER

Councillors Present Were: Mr. P. Grainger (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips (Vice Chairman), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. J. Sowinski.

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk) and two parishioners (one left after the Public Participation part of the meeting and the other after the NELS Group submission.

Apologies for Absence: Mr. F. Gillespie, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. C. Smith and Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor).

Public Participation

Mr. Jim Biggie, representing North Elmham Tennis Club, wished to clarify the position with CCTV cameras on the Playing Field, at the Pavilion and near the tennis courts. It was explained that two contractors have visited to discuss proposals to upgrade the present system to also cover the Tennis Club and equipment. To date, one quotation has been received which is expensive. As a result, a further one is being obtained. An alternative is to have separate cameras at the Tennis Club not linked to those at the Pavilion which would require a separate storage facility at the Tennis Club. The Tennis Club is holding its A.G.M. on Tuesday, 14th October and Mr. Biggie will further discuss the matter with the committee

Update from North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group

Mr. Ben Earle visited to update members on his biodiversity action plan (BAP). The plan, which was duly circulated, is designed to develop the village through sustainable interventions that will also help to tackle the cost-of-living crisis. In addition, it will support and promote nature connectedness in young people and general physical and mental health across the community.

Proposals were outlined in respect of a possible project in Boars Hill with associated funding needs, together with the availability of grants, including the National Lottery Community Fund.

Mr. Fitzalan Howard queried how difficult it would be to monitor and control any projects of this type. It was agreed that initially Mr. Earle would liaise with Mr. Sowinski with a view to commencing involvement with the current Millennium Wood project and any subsequent items which may follow in due course.

Updated Information and Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Two picnic tables are ready to be put in place on the Village Green. The much-awaited camel is also to be returned to its original home.

Cathedral Ruins: Publicity regarding the site has appeared in Elmham News. There has been no response to our annual invoice, (£5,355 awaited), and the matter will again be chased.

Cathedral Meadows: Fencing with new posts is required. One estimate has been received with two more to be obtained.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood):

A seat has been removed, pressure washed and repainted. The latch on the gate has been changed to reduce the noise level when it is closed.

Allotments

Mr. Phillips advised that the collection of rents will take place in the Pavilion on 9th October. Many have already been received.

Street Lights

A quotation of £2.5K+VAT had been received to replace the light outside 76 Holt Road. It was agreed that members would visit the site to inspect the spot and also talk to residents.

Highway Matters

A resident in a property near the school reported that the Boars Hill developers had not kept a promise to put up a hedge at the edge of his property. There is a fence in place at the moment but it is not high enough to prevent people looking into his garden as they pass. It is a rented property and it was felt that he needs to draw this matter to the attention of his landlord.

The Gateways which will assist in improved road safety have been delivered and it is the intention for these to be installed in the near future. The hedge near 39 Station Road has been cut. Mr. Gillespie is to give a full report on this issue at the next meeting.

It was suggested that the build-out near the surgery would benefit from having a priority sign for the guidance of traffic.

Pavilion and Playing Field

The question of the provision of a Christmas tree was raised and the general view was in favour of having one. Mr. Sowinski is to talk to Nick Saunders.

The previous quotation for a new CCTV facility was in the region of £6.5K but an alternative option has been priced at about £1.5K.

Miss Ferris has prepared a booking form for the Pavilion and this is to be circulated for consideration. The waste paper facility is to be removed shortly by Whites as this service is to be no longer available.

It was agreed by all to switch the trade waste facility from Biffa to Breckland Council. The appropriate notice will be served on Biffa. (Proposed by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Fitzalan Howard).

Work has not yet been done on the guttering (quotation of £660 received for guttering and replacement of roof tiles). It was agreed by all to proceed (proposed by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mr. Sowinski).

Boars Hill Development Update

Following the successful installation of two new dog waste bins which are being suitably utilised, it has been reported that the bin on the western side of the Village Green is badly damaged with the bottom not holding packages deposited, as required. This bin is slightly larger in size and will need to be replaced by a Fido 50. All in favour of purchasing this item (proposed by Mr. Gee and seconded by Mr. Rayner).

E-on Next continue to struggle with understanding the current position with regard to EV charging points but have finally issued a contract which involves a standing charge of 30p per day and a unit rate of 22.9p per kWh. They have been advised that they will be notified when the points are ready to be made available for use.

The development is subject to a 20 mph Speed Limit Zone Order which came into operation on 15th September, 2025, as advised by Norfolk County Council.

A note had been received from Fiona Wilson of Breckland Council which basically summarised the current position regarding the EV charging points. She is to be asked to provide assistance in finding a contractor to take on the administration of the system.

Overview of Parish Council Financial Situation

The final AGAR report had been circulated, duly discussed and accepted by all members.

Defibrillators

Miss Ferris reported that all defibrillators are now fully operational.

New Village Hall

A valuation for the Eastgate Centre is awaited. Mr. Phillips will chase.

The cricket nets have not yet been moved from the corner of the Playing Field near the Pavilion. The Clerk will chase.

Audit

The final response to the audit (AGAR) had been received from the external auditors. Two matters had been raised which had previously been circulated to members with information duly given as follows:

1) Section 1, Assertion 9 has been incorrectly completed. Mr. Phillips' explanation is below and relates to the historic, dormant Village Green Trust Charity which has had a Nil balance for some six years. The auditors spent much time discussing and eventually deciding that the "Yes" box shouldn't have been ticked as we hadn't met our responsibilities as sole managing trustee by not filing a report. They then spent just as long on deciding whether the "No" box or the "N/A" box should have been ticked and eventually plumped for "No".

With regards to No1, I can comment that the Charity has filed a NIL return of income and expenditure since 2018/19. From 2024 & 2025 year we could not file the returns as the new system with the Charity Commission did not allow us to do so as the Trustee (NEPC) is a corporate body.

When I spoke to the CC I asked if we could delete the charity as there was no land, cash or any other assets. I did make the CC aware that the PC would honour their obligations to the Village Green and the play equipment, for the foreseeable future. I also asked if there was any documentation required to be signed and filed. Their answer was that as it had been dormant for so long, closure could be confirmed by an online form which was completed and receipted by the CC on 12th December 2024. The Charity was then marked as "Removed".

2) The smaller authority did not comply with regulation 15. The auditors provided

the standard form as usual regarding the Notice of Public Rights with dates from 3rd June, 2025 to 14th July, 2025, which were duly used and advertised on the website. Unfortunately, we held our meeting on 4th June, 2025 which means that the dates should have been amended to 5th June, 2025 to 16th July, 2025 as the form should not be exhibited until the Parish Council meeting authorising AGAR has been held.



ELMHAM WILDLIFE







When I'm walking around the village looking for nature my interest in wildlife is usually pretty obvious from the gear that I'm carrying. As a result, people I meet often like to stop and tell me about the things they've seen, which is always lovely to hear. The one thing they tell me about more than anything else – in fact possibly more than everything else put together is deer. Deer being large enough to see even from a distance without binoculars are, I suppose, the wild animals that a casual walker is most likely to see. There are plenty of deer around North Elmham so they provide lots of opportunities. They're not always especially shy and although they are partly nocturnal, they're

In North Elmham two species of deer are common: Muntjac (photo 1) and Roe Deer (photo 2). The Muntjac is our smallest deer, no bigger than many dogs. It's not native to the British Isles but has become established here after animals that had been introduced to deer parks (particularly one at Woburn Abbey in Bedfordshire) escaped in the early nineteenth century.

often active during the daytime too.

Muntjac are short-legged, short-necked deer with an arched back and rounded rear end (photo 3). Their posture varies though and sometimes they can stand taller and straighter, and then they can easily be confused with Roe Deer. Male Muntjac have short unbranched







antlers, curved inwards and backwards, and both sexes usually show a pair of diverging dark lines extending back from their nose (photo 4).

I've seen Muntjac in my driveway and on the green so they will come right in among the built up parts of the village. Roe Deer are less likely to do so preferring to stay in the fields and woodland around the village, but sometimes an individual deer can become quite tame.

Roe Deer is one of only two species of deer that are truly native in the UK (Red Deer being the other). They stand taller with straight backs and they usually show a prominent white rump patch when seen from behind (photos 5 & 6).

Roe Deer were once hunted almost to extinction but their numbers are now so high that they can be a nuisance. Muntjac also cause problems, feeding heavily on young shoots, flowers and foliage. Not only is this a problem for gardeners and farmers, but it also wrecks woodland undergrowth and inhibits natural regeneration. This is often cited as a reason for reintroducing Lynx which, it is argued, might help to restore the natural balance. Personally I can't see Lynx ever being common enough to make a dent in the deer population and unfortunately I think the problem of high deer numbers is one that won't go away easily.

There are two or three other species of deer that you could plausibly see in North Elmham, though I haven't definitely seen any of them. I'm pretty sure I did catch a glimpse of a Chinese Water Deer here once but I didn't see it clearly enough to confirm. This is another non-native species that originated at Woburn Abbey but for many decades the Norfolk





Broads has been the stronghold for their naturalised population. In recent years they've been spreading and I now see them only a few miles away from here so wouldn't be at all surprised to find them in our parish. Chinese Water Deer are somewhat intermediate in size and shape between Muntjac and Roe Deer, but are a paler sandier colour (photo 7). Males have a distinctive tusk, a long tooth that hangs externally from the side of the mouth. Although they're often associated with wetlands, they also seem quite at home in arable farmland.

I haven't seen Red Deer in North Elmham but they're doing well in Norfolk and I see them occasionally in other parts of the county. The largest wild herds are probably in the north and especially the east of the county but there are records of them all over. Recently I captured footage of Red Deer on one of the trail cameras I have out about 2-3 miles to the south of us, so they certainly close to us. You'll be familiar with Red Deer if you've ever spent much time in the Highlands but they're huge deer with long heads (photo 8 – I hope you'll excuse me for using a photo taken in Scotland!). Older stags can be enormous with elaborate branched antlers but even young females dwarf our Roe Deer.

There's perhaps a chance of seeing Fallow Deer here too, but I'm not aware of any herds very close to North Elmham. In Norfolk they're mostly restricted to private deer parks but they do get out quite regularly. I've seen them away from deer parks a few times, but never very close to North Elmham.

I'd be especially interested to hear from you if you've encountered Chinese Water Deer, Red Deer or Fallow Deer in North



I am writing these in the first few days of November whilst cruising the Norwegian Fjords and the snow-capped mountains are putting me in the mood for the coming season.

This edition of your magazine covers two new year beginnings. The start of 2026 in January and the beginning of the new Christian year which starts with the period of Advent in December.

In one of the villages I have visited on our trip round Norway, there is a year round Christmas shop. In many ways the secular Christmas and all its trappings appears to be taking many away from what it's true meaning is.

Christmas is all about love, God's love for this world that he created. A love so strong that he sent his only son to redeem it. A son who would later die at the hands of those he came to save.

One of the great traditions of Christmas is the singing of carols. I love hearing carols being sung in Church or by groups of carol singers. The singing of carols has a longer history than most people realise.

In the 13th century, influenced by Francis of Assisi a strong tradition of popular Christmas songs in regional native languages developed all over Europe and Christmas carols in English first appear in 1426.

Please note: this does not necessarily mean you require a follow-up appointment. If any result needs further discussion, monitoring, or treatment, we will contact you directly.

If You Do Not Hear From Us

If you do not receive a message or phone call after your results have been reviewed, this means:

- Your results are within an acceptable or expected range
- · No further action is required at this time
- You do not need to contact the surgery to check your results

Christmas Yule Log

115 grams caster sugar

65 grams self-raising flour

4 large eggs (free-range)

40 grams cocoa solids

400 grams chocolate (finely chopped)

450 ml double cream

35 ml whipped cream

Garnish: powdered sugar

- Preheat the over to 2000 /1800. Grease a 33423 cm.
 Swiss roll tin and line with baking parchiment.
- Sift together flour and cocoa and gently fold the two together.
 Do not overmix.
- · Whisk the eggs until fluffy and pale in color.
- Gently which together the wet and dry ingredients until just combined.
- Pour the sake batter into the tim. Bake for S to 10 min, or until the cake is golden and lightly risen.
- Out a piece of baking parthment slightly larger than the cake.
 Place onto a workton, sprinkle with icing sugar and swiftly turn the cakes outo the paper.
- Starting from the top end roll the cake up with the paper on the inside.
- Add the chocolate and cream to a bowl and place over a pan of barely simmering water to melt. Once melted, put into the fridge to cool and thicken.
- Linvoil the cake, spread the top side with 1/2 of the chocolate cream, followed by the wispped cream and voll once more.
- Pipe the remaining cream lengthwise to cover the whole cake
- including the ends.

 Gently fork the chocolate cream to roughen the "bark" slightly.
- . Dust with powdered sugar.
