ELMHAM NEWS WINS NATIONAL COMPETITION

Elmham News has won the nation's best A5 magazine out of 450 entries. This is only the second time we have entered the National Parish Magazine Awards run by Parish Mag Printers. Last time we came 13th, but the 2022 panel of judges chose Elmham News as first in the A5 category and winner of the Best Magazine Overall. There are five categories for A4 and A5 magazines.

The recipe for a successful magazine is a good range of content and a keen sense of what is relevant to our readers. We could not do this without our contributors and of course our advertisers.

The News has come a long way since its conception in December 1977. It came out of an idea put forward by the church but it was to be of interest to the whole community. It was to be free of charge and delivered to every house in the village including Worthing and Billingford. Approximately 575 copies were printed and distributed.

A small group co-ordinated the collection of information, typing on an electric typewriter and then the printing on an ancient Gestetner machine which lived in the Church vestry! Very often, after a session printing, there was indelible ink everywhere, especially on our hands when Charlie had re-inked it! Then we took it home and painstakingly took the sheets and put them into page order before folding and stapling them. Then they were taken to the valiant band of deliverers.

Donations made it possible for us to thrive and find a local printer who would print 6 months of advert pages at a time (stored in Bob's garage!) and then came the counting out of the actual content pages plus the adverts and taking them to the deliverers, many of whom stapled the magazine together. I think we rarely made mistakes, though someone did manage to put pages in upside down on one occasion.

We produced two A4 booklets, the first was to mark The Millennium in 2000 which contains the history of the village plus articles about life and work here in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, the school, the surgery, the railway, County School, different buildings and

places of interest among others. We had the pages typed up by Gill and printed by Shipdham Press and then spent one evening in the Memorial Hall collating it and tying each copy up with red ribbon!

The second followed soon after, to celebrate 25 years of the magazine published in 2002. This was printed and produced again by Shipdham Press. Both hefty booklets were delivered free to every house. I believe there may be one or two around if anyone is interested.

We have changed printers a few times before settling with Clan Press of King's Lynn who produce today's superior copy which is now all in colour! Today, 800 copies are printed and distributed, still free of charge, though donations are always welcome.

Great strides have been made from our early days of printing ourselves; it may be produced on a computer now and emailed to the printers but there's still a great deal of work involved and time dedicated. During the time Mike Wyatt was involved his knowledge and excellent photographs took us to a new level. Now we have Sarah Felton and she has propelled us further yet and really is the reason that the content we receive is turned into the professional magazine that is delivered through your door each month.

We entered the competition back in July and to find out about our success in December really was a great Christmas present! The whole team are absolutely thrilled to have won this competition, it is such a huge achievement and makes all the hard work each month worth while.

We would like to thank everyone involved with making Elmham News the BEST!



70TH ANNIVERSARY

It has been the 70th Anniversary of the 'Surge' which devastated parts of the coastline along the Eastern side of England.

We printed a piece in the December edition of the News from Norman Lowe about the surge at the end of January 1953. Large tracts of land were devastated along the coastline and property was lost or badly damaged and because of the ferocity of the sea surging over the marshes lives too were lost.

My husband, Bob Woodhouse, was nine at that time and he and his family were living at Salthouse which was badly affected. Bob's family were living in a house called Edenfield, facing the main road through the village, but set a little way back from the road.

On a Saturday evening his father would catch the bus to Sheringham to collect the football papers which he would take to the Dun Cow Pub for distribution. On this particular Saturday evening January 31st 1953, as he went to the bus stop he realised what was happening. As the sea was over the road, there was the most tremendous noise from the sea and the wind. He rushed home and told the family that the sea was coming and they must get out! On previous occasions the sea had been across the road but had never gone further.

Unfortunately, their house had no back door, so they had to go out through the front door. Bob said the water was nearly up to his chest. They struggled up the slope and out of danger, then Bob suddenly thought of a neighbour who lived at the side of their house who everyone called Granny Wall. A neighbour had the same thought and he and Bob's father, and Bob, managed to reach her and pull her up to higher ground. The water was rising all the time this was going on.

Salthouse was devastated in half an hour.

Behind the house there was a footpath which went towards the church. They arrived at the church as did many other villagers and stayed for the night.

Every family whose house had been damaged were taken in by other households who were further away from the road and undamaged. Bob and his family did go back to their house for a short time until the North Norfolk Council had built Council Houses at Weybourne, which is where the family finally made their home.

The Council waived the rent money for the first year for these people who were caught up in the flood.

WEDNESDAY 7TH DECEMBER 2022

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website , www. elmham.org.uk , once approved.

Public Participation

Land Management Matters

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble reported that English Heritage had carried out a survey and there were some safety concerns, hence the railings being placed around the tower. It is on their list to be included in the budget for next year.

Cathedral Meadows: The eight small signs regarding "dogs on leads" are in place and the fencing work has been carried out. Mr. Fitzalan Howard is to be asked to liaise with Mrs. Wade-Martins regarding water draining across Cathedral Mead.

Bridleway on Disused Railway Line and Other Railway Linked Matters: Although the railway company have previously agreed that the path is not a permissive one, notices are still displayed referring to "permissive". The Chairman or Mr. Rayner will make contact with the MNR.



Prince William Wood: An email has been received from a parishioner expressing concern with a number of matters, not least the gate which allows pedestrians to pass between Orchard Close and Prince William Wood. The property and land in question belongs to and is the responsibility of Victory Housing. Mr. Markwell will make contact with the parishioner to explain that the Housing Association should be approached with a view to them exploring possible solutions to the issues raised.

Allotments

Mr. Phillips said that the final rental payment had been received.

Street Lights

Mr. Markwell reported that U.K. Power Networks are due to fix the light in Pump Street on 18/1/23 and a quotation is being obtained for the light in Eastgate Street.

Highway Matters

New batteries have been obtained for the SAM devices.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Thanks were expressed to Mr. Smith for all his work on the lights. A quotation of \pounds 1,932.91 has been received for the new lighting required. In addition, one extra socket is needed outside. Mr. Phillips proposed that this work be carried out. Seconded by Mrs. Keeble. All in favour.

Defibrillators

There has been no direct contact from anyone wishing to be involved in the training. The new defibrillator has not yet arrived.

Call for Sites – Breckland Council

Mr. Rayner had drafted a letter to George Freeman M.P. opposing the idea of a new town curiously referred to as the "Norfolk Railway Village". Neighbouring Parish Councils are to be invited to sign this letter , a copy of which is to be sent to Mr. Bambridge. The Chairman and Mr. Rayner are to attend the Consultation Meeting at Breckland Council on 20th December, 2022.

Police Community Resolution for Criminal Damage Incident

Mr. Gee is to make contact with the young person responsible for this crime regarding the next piece of work to be carried out.

Annual Budget

Mr. Phillips produced the final budget for 2023/2024 which had been circulated to members in advance of the meeting. The tax base for 2023/2024 is higher (502.6) than the figure for the current year (494.1). Projected income is £58,212 with expenditure of £61,124. The Band D contribution will remain at £80.24 which gives a Precept of £40,530. These figures were proposed for acceptance by Mrs. Keeble and seconded by Mr. Markwell, All in favour. (All actual financial details are contained in the approved Parish Council Meeting minutes kept in the Post Office and on the Community website: www.elmham.org.uk

Report from District Councillor

Mr. Bambridge reported that he is now dealing with housing in Breckland. There are currently some 1,500 people on the waiting list which is the highest it has been for some time. Over 100 of these are classified as "emergencies" requiring immediate attention with a further 350 who should be housed within a week. There are not enough three bedroom houses in the district.

BRECKLAND LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION

Following on from the report on the Call for Sites and the proposed New Town, things have progressed with the Full Review of Breckland's Local Plan. The next step is for what's called the 'Issues & Options' consultation. This will take place over a period of 8 weeks and at the time of writing is expected to start at the end of January. This consultation is about the large-scale strategic objectives of the Plan, including housing, the economy, the natural environment, Climate Change, transport and infrastructure. For housing, this consultation will not be asking questions about where sites should be – that will come towards the end of 2023. Details of the consultation will be circulated by Breckland DC via their website and other channels. Responses will be possible online but also in writing if preferred.

North Elmham Parish Council urges residents to take part in the consultations, to make their views known. In particular, if you are against the proposal for a New Town in Bintree/Billingford it will be helpful to respond to Ouestion 13 of the Issues and Options consultation. This asks if you think there should be a new settlement Garden Town/Village developed within Breckland, with a box in which to explain your answer. Bearing in mind this is not asking about specific sites, the Parish Council will be answering "No" to this question, before explaining that it may be possible to have a new settlement somewhere in Breckland, but only if housing target numbers are so high that organic growth of existing settlements couldn't meet the need, which is unlikely.

In addition, all of the following criteria would need to be met for any New Town: any site would have to have existing transport and other necessary infrastructure, or 100% certainty that it would be delivered before the new settlement was occupied - this would good ("A" road and preferably dualcarriageway) road links and commercial rail with a station in the new settlement: sufficient jobs in the new settlement to ensure it did not become a commuter dormitory town or village; it must not harm the local environment, landscape or wildlife, including the risk of polluting run-off or groundwater; adequate waterresources and sewerage treatment; not be sited primarily on BMV (Best and Most Versatile) agricultural land; have the necessary schools and NHS facilities in place before occupation; not contribute to Climate Change e.g. by being cardependent; not be sited on reserves of

gravel or minerals which may need to be exploited in future.

Any respondent does not have to answer all the questions, just the ones which you wish to. The Parish Council will also be responding to a range of other questions, which will be discussed at its February meeting. There will be another consultation, probably in late 2023, which will ask for opinions on specific sites, including that for a New Town at Bintree/ Billingford. I'll give further updates as more about the Full Review becomes known.

Land Management Matters

Cathedral Ruins: Some of the railings placed around the tower have been moved.

Cathedral Meadows: The Stewardship Agreement runs out in October. Natural England has indicated that an extension of five years should be offered. Brown and Co will be consulted.

Broom Green: Mr. Labouchere said that the pond may need to be scraped out again with a digger at some stage.

Bridleway on Disused Railway Line and Other Railway Linked Matters:

Although the railway company have previously agreed that the path is not a permissive one, notices are still displayed referring to "permissive". Mr. Rayner has written to the Chairman of MNR regarding this matter.

Prince William Wood: The gate which allows pedestrians to pass between Orchard Close and Prince William Wood will be discussed at the next meeting.

Street Lights

A connection box is to be inserted for the light in Eastgate Street.

Highway Matters

Mr. Carr has formed a Community Speedwatch Group with eight volunteers currently undergoing training. Mr. Labouchere was in favour of double yellow lines being extended near the Brookside development but it was agreed to take no action until it is possible to assess the impact of the new car park.

It was confirmed that salt bins are seasonally maintained.

Pavilion and Playing Field

New lighting is to be fitted and a defibrillator box is to be supplied.

Defibrillators

Training is to be arranged via the Ambulance Service. The new defibrillator, which is coming from U.S.A., has not arrived yet. The cabinet is being sent, in advance, separately.

Call for Sites Update Breckland Council

The Consultation Meeting at Breckland Council took place on 20th December, 2022.

Apparently, the village booklet is being discontinued. Confusion had arisen with a site being noted in the Billingford booklet rather than the one for North Elmham. The consultation will probably open at the end of January for a period of eight weeks. Questions are to be drafted by Mr. Rayner for discussion at the next Parish Council meeting. Some queries are to be raised in respect of new settlements (garden towns/villages), in particular regarding question 13 from the document. Mr. Rayner is to produce a summary piece for Elmham News. A meeting of the CANT Group is to be arranged for the end of February/beginning of March.

Pavilion Funding

Information has been received, following an introduction via Active Norfolk, which may result in a source of possible funding being accessible.

Police Community Resolution for Criminal Damage Incident

Mr. Gee is to pay a visit to the young person responsible for this crime regarding the next piece of work to be carried out.

Annual Budget

Mr. Phillips circulated the latest Management Financial Report, as at December 2022, which was broadly in line with expectations.

Reinsertion of the Members' Code of Conduct on the Website

It had been noted that the Code of Conduct was not being displayed on the website. The version utilised by Breckland Council had previously been adopted and it was agreed by all to continue with this policy. (Proposed by Mr. Fitzalan Howard and seconded by Mr. Phillips). The principles highlighted are selflessness, integrity, objectivity, accountability, openness, honesty and leadership.

Report from County/District Councillor

Mr. Borrett provided updated information on a number of key areas including the ever increasing pressure on social care and the present position with the proposed Norwich Western Link road which is planned to connect the Broadland Northway with the A47, but has run into difficulty following the discovery of a colony of rare barbastelle bats.

Discussions also took place regarding the idea of a new town, curiously referred to as the "Norfolk Railway Village".

VILLAGE NEWSLETTERS

Before the birth of the Elmham News there had been some kind of village newsletters here in the village .It was usually a church based newsletter.

The earliest ones we have found were written by the Rev Townsend (1898 – 1946) who put together the church news. It was a single sheet of paper folded in half. He was always very appreciative of the ladies who kept the floral arrangements going in church and the Christmas decorations. There were always Jumble Sales and other money saving ventures going on as well as articles written by the Rev Townsend about the history of the village.

After his death in 1946 the church had an American Vicar here for a couple of years, Rev Jack Roberts, then Rev Ward, (1950 1955)- 19 who had a monthly newsletter printed, I have a vague recollection of it being quite small . Rev Ward was only here for five years then he went on to become Chaplain to the Queen at Windsor. As far as we are aware there were no more village newsletters until The Elmham News was born at the end of 1977.

"RAILWAY VILLAGE" IN THE HEART OF THE NORFOLK COUNTRYSIDE

In 2018 a plan emerged to build a town of 10,000 homes on land sandwiched between North Elmham and its neighbouring villages. A Campaign Group "CANT" was set up. CANT (Campaign Against the New Town) fought really hard to oppose the application and with the help of North Elmham parishioners and local villages around the idea was eventually dropped by Breckland Council.

For readers that may not remember this, the town would have been built on land between North Elmham, Billingford and Bintree. The impact of it would have been enormous for many of the surrounding parishes, as well as Dereham itself. There were concerns in Dereham that the trains making their way up and down the line to Wymondham would cause havoc for the already gridlocked routes through the town. The plan presented to Breckland was a quick copy and paste tabletop exercise built on the grand idea that the new town would be linked by the old railway line running from County School Station to the main line railway at Dereham. (bearing in mind that the track does not exist in a functioning manner). It did not seem to matter to the developer that the town would be in the middle of a rural landscape or adjacent to the River Wensum. Ludicrous, though it was, the plan had to be taken seriously. It would have progressed without local opposition. The 2018 scheme was opposed by many residents who also went along to the Breckland Meeting. The developer did not even dare to turn up to the Breckland Meeting which threw the idea out as ridiculous.

William Nunn, Council Leader at the time, said it was the most people he had ever seen attend a meeting in his 24 years on the authority. Councillors voted to reject the scheme almost unanimously at that meeting. However, a new proposal has been put forward as part of Breckland's consultation on its new local plan.

The Conservative-run authority was asking last year for landowners to come forward with sites which could potentially be built on over the next two decades.

The 5,000-home submission, which is not a formal planning application, came forward as part of that process.

If a planning application is submitted, approved and the housing is built, the resulting settlement would likely have a larger population than existing towns like Watton (population 8,417), Fakenham (8,285) and Cromer (7,949).

The submission documents which put the 1,278-acre site forwards called it the "Norfolk Railway Village", suggesting that the new development could take advantage of the Mid Norfolk Railway, a heritage line which stops at North Elmham. It could be connected to the national rail network at Wymondham, which could in theory mean the 5,000 new homes would be connected to the rest of the country, if services were extended up the line.

Jennie Borgnis, chair of North Elmham Parish Council, said her council would "definitely" be campaigning against the project - and had been in contact with neighbouring villages about combining forces. She added that they were opposed to the proposal for several reasons.

- It's nowhere near a trunk road for a start, which any sort of big development realistically would have to be and it would create all sorts of traffic chaos in Dereham specifically, but generally too.
- The Wensum Valley is a highlyprotected part of the county and the number of houses would be bound to have an effect on the water-course.

 If the developers are genuinely thinking that the railway is the thing that's going to swing it for them, they have got to convince everybody that there is going to be a railway company that will be prepared to run it." The fear is that they will rely on the railway aspect of it, and then quietly drop it when they realise it's a non-starter.

CANT will be distributing leaflets, emails and social media posts to encourage people to participate in the consultation. And Mrs Borgnis said the possibility of a fresh protest like the kind seen in 2018 would "almost certainly" have to happen, if the new scheme became advanced enough to reach the council's planning committee.


She said however that she was not opposed to the principle of more housing being built elsewhere and that the existence of Britain's housing shortage was "unarguable" but we need more houses of the right type, and they need to be in the right place," which was primarily in towns, near to existing services and employment areas.

The Norfolk branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England said they were opposed to a new settlement being built anywhere in Breckland. "Given the need to maintain agricultural land, and to keep the special and valued qualities of Norfolk's countryside and landscapes, there is no need for a new settlement in Breckland" said a spokesperson for CPRE.

CANT is now being resurrected, as residents across Breckland are soon to be asked whether a new "garden town" should be built somewhere within the district - with the trimmed-back 5,000home proposal believed to be one of the main contenders for that project.

NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

I thought I'd change how I do things with this column this year. Up to now I've told you about things that I've found over the past month, but I'm going to try something different. I may still bring in some highlights from recent observations, but I thought I'd try picking a different set of North Elmham wildlife to write about each month, so restricting myself to topic more than timescale. I'll try to illustrate it with photos that I've taken in North Elmham as I've always done, but I may slip the odd one in that I've taken elsewhere if they're better. So, this month I'm going to start with winter wildfowl. Not an obvious place to start perhaps, as for the most part wildfowl like expanses of water, and apart from the river there aren't many publiclyaccessible lakes or marshes here, but I think we have enough variety here in North Elmham to make it work. Let's see...

The term "wildfowl" can mean different things to different people. In its narrowest sense it refers to ducks, geese and swans, but in its broader sense it can include other waterbirds such as grebes, coots and cormorants (the term "waterfowl" better describes this larger group), or sometimes other gamebirds. Wildfowl include some our most familiar birds and nearly everyone, even those with no interest in wildlife, will recognise a duck or goose or swan, even if they don't know which species are involved. Ducks are among our most diverse and colourful birds with the males (drakes) exhibiting a fantastic array of plumages.

The easiest of all the wildfowl to see in North Elmham is the Mallard. They are here all year round and they're not very fussy about the habitat they occupy – you can find them in the smallest of ditches or ponds as well as larger bodies of water. The drakes are colourful with shiny green heads separated from their dark purply breast by a bright white collar, yellow bills,

orange legs and iridescent purply-blue wing patches (photo 1). Have you noticed their curly tails, a character that is unique to Mallards? Technically the curly feathers are not tail feathers but elongated upper tail coverts that extend beyond their tails. The tail coverts look black at a glance but are iridescent green in sunlight. Mallards are the ancestors of nearly all of our domestic ducks, and these come in a huge variety of shapes, sizes and colours – though rarely look as smart as their wild ancestors in my opinion.

The next easiest duck to see locally is the Teal. This is our smallest duck, and many thousands visit Norfolk for the winter. In North Elmham you can see them on the river sometimes, or in larger puddles or flooded fields such as those along the railway. The other day I accidentally flushed a pair from puddles in roadside fields along Heath Road, so they can turn up anywhere. A handful stay to breed in Norfolk so it's possible to see them all year round, but the largest numbers are present in winter. They can be hard to approach closely - some of my best photos are taken from hides including this one (photo 2) which was up the road at Ryburgh.

Another duck you're likely to see around North Elmham is the Gadwall. Once a rarity this species has become one of our commoner ducks now and can be encountered around North Elmham at any time of the year with a mixture of locallybreeding birds and winter visitors. I often see them when walking along the railway but the one in the photo was on the river (photo 3). The drakes aren't as colourful as other ducks but smart in their own way. Both sexes can be recognised by a small white square patch towards the back of their wings, but as with the one in the photo, this can disappear depending on how they hold their wings.

Wigeons are unusual among ducks as their main feeding technique is to graze

But they rarely stray far from water and the best place to see them in North Elmham is at the seasonal pool at Bintree Mill where there is often a large wintering flock. They flush easily so approach quietly and carefully – and hopefully before anyone else has flushed them. I sometimes see them elsewhere around the parish, but not so often. Drakes have large white patches on their forewings which makes them easy to recognise in flight.

Other ducks you're likely to see at Bintree Mill in winter are Shoveler (photo 5 another one from Ryburgh) and Tufted Duck (photo 6, also taken elsewhere). Shelduck are also possible and if you're lucky you could see Pintail, Pochard or, in early spring, Garganey. Despite their name, Egyptian Geese are more closely related to Shelducks than they are to geese. They're native to Africa but now breed prolifically in the UK, especially in East Anglia, and you can come across them anywhere in the valley or farmland around North Elmham. They nest in trees, so you may even see (and probably first hear) a pair high above your head in an old bare tree (photo 7).

The commonest goose in North Elmham is the Greylag Goose. Wild Greylag Geese visit the UK in winter but most of the ones we see round here are feral birds whose ancestors were released for shooting. You may find feeding flocks on the fields round the village, or resting in the valley, but I most often see them flying around (photo 8). Canada Goose is another species that was introduced for shooting. this time from North America. I don't see them guite so often in North Elmham, but they're not unusual here. Again I mostly see them flying over (photo 9), but a flock sometimes roosts by Bintree Mill. Another feral goose that lives in the Wensum Valley is the Barnacle Goose – less often seen in North Elmham but I come across

them occasionally, like the pair that spent some time with Greylag Geese just this side of Guist Bridge last spring (photo 10).

Of the truly wild geese that winter in Norfolk the one you're most likely to see round here is the Pink-footed Goose. Flocks, sometimes numbering in their hundreds, often fly over North Elmham in the winter, readily separated from other geese by their "wink-wink" call and shorter necks. Despite regularly seeing them flying over, I'm yet to encounter any on the ground in North Elmham (so I'll use a photo from elsewhere – photo 11), but only last week a couple of friends saw a small flock feeding in fields along the Ryburgh Road near Heath Farm.

There is only one species of swan that you're likely to see in North Elmham: the Mute Swan, which most readers will be familiar with. If you're very lucky you might see either of the two species of wild swan that winter in Norfolk, Bewick's Swan or Whooper Swan. Adults of both species have yellow on the bill, not red as on Mute Swan, and young birds are grey, in contrast to the more brown-toned plumage of young Mute Swans. They hold their necks straighter too which can make it easy to pick them out from Mute Swans at a distance. As I write there are four Bewick's Swans and a Whooper Swan in farmland between Great Ryburgh and Colkirk, as unusual there as they would be here (one of these Bewick's in photo 12).

By the end of 2022, WVBS was feeling back to normal, and we were able to mix and socialise with very little restraint. We celebrated with a very enjoyable Christmas party that included a photographic competition for the best bird photos taken in the Valley last year and a series of guizzes. Members brought plates of food for sharing and the standard was, as usual, very high. So now we have a full programme of events for 2023, and it is available on our website - www.wvbs.co.uk Do have a look at the site if you are interested. It includes useful information about bird-watching sites in the valley as well as reports of previous meetings and a way to report your own sightings for inclusion in the County records.

The last field trip of 2022 took us all the way to the Wildlife and Wetland Trust reserve at Welney, with a stop at Denver Sluice on the way. Here we were lucky to get several views of a Kingfisher, which finally perched on the metalwork of the sluice just in front of us. Across the road a flock of Yellowhammers delighted us, with Redwings and Redshanks also seen. In spite of the rain we headed off for Welney, where the big bonus is the visitor centre with views over Lady Fen and then the main hide which is heated! We were there for feeding time, when the visiting wild swans and waterfowl are fed grain in front of the hide. Its always fun to see, although the very high water levels meant there were not as many swans as usual. Nonetheless the Whooper swans and Pochards made a great spectacle, and we saw a good selection of waders by carefully examining the banks and edges. These included a Spotted Redshank, a good flock of Black-tailed Godwits and some Ringed Plover. Back over the bridge at the visitor centre we mostly had some lunch and then looked out for the

Short-eared Owls that seem to be regulars over the Fen. We weren't disappointed, and some members then headed for Methwold where a Great Grey Shrike could be seen.

We kicked of 2023 with the annual bird count in the Valley, and at this point I know that over 90 species were recorded in total. One of those species was Bewick's Swan, seen near Colkirk and an unusual visitor to this area. More details next time! Meanwhile here are our next few meetings – more information on the website.

- Sift flour into a bowl and make a hole in the middle. In a separate bowl, whisk together the egg and milk and pour into the hole.
- Whisk the mix with some flour and gradually start adding the rest of the flour until you have a smooth batter. Cover the bowl and leave for 30 minutes.
- Heat a frying pan to a medium heat and spray some cooking oil. Using a ladle, pour some of the mixture into the pan and tilt the pan until it spreads out evenly.
- Cook one side of the pancake until it's golden or lightly brown and toss or flip it over, or if you are not brave enough, use a slice or palette knife will help. Cooking time will depend on the hob but it's usually about 45-60 seconds on each side.
- Make sure to spray cooking oil before each pancake and cook until the batter is finished.
- Stack all pancakes and add your favourite toppings which could be some scrummie and mouth watering layers with perhaps syrup, lemon, fruit, ice cream or even chocolate, but enjoy while you can before any fasting begins during Lent.

I wonder however, who will succeed in tossing their pancake and leaving it stuck on the ceiling?
