NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 5TH APRIL 2023

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors present were: Mrs. J. Borgnis (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips, Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. P. Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. C.Smith

Also in attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. B. Borrett (County and District Councillors), Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor) and four parishioners.

Apologies for absence: None

Public Participation

The following matters were raised:-

a) A parishioner from a nearby village was concerned with the extra housing planned for Fakenham and the recent sewage problems in the town. The standard of water from taps was considered very poor and undrinkable. Mr. Bambridge suggested that contact should be made with the Environment Agency who have recently had a new chief officer appointed. Strong opposition to a new town being proposed near North Elmham was expressed.

b) A parishioner asked why he hadn't received a copy of the Stewardship Agreement for the area which adjoins his land. Mr. Fitzalan Howard stated that it had been explained, on at least three occasions in recent times, that a copy of the agreement could be obtained from Brown and Co (Abigail Maynard) who have permission to release it to the parishioner requesting it. It is hoped that this advice will now finally be taken.

Updated Information and Matters Arising

Update on Affordable Housing Scheme Nothing to report.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Mr. Gee reported that, following work, the pipe can now be seen.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble said that new fencing has been installed. The seat near the Ruins has been reversed into and it needs replacing as the concrete on both sides is broken. We are aware of the availability of Charles III Coronation seats (four seater) at a cost of £799. Mr. Markwell proposed that one be purchased and this was seconded by Mr. Smith. All in favour except for one abstention.

Cathedral Meadows: The Stewardship Agreement has been extended for a further five years as previously agreed.

Broom Green: Mr. Labouchere reiterated that the pond will need attention this year and he will meet Mr. Cook on site in the not too distant future

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: Mr. Rayner had checked the large stone and it appears that it had been dragged from the undergrowth and had not fallen from the bridge. It will be removed in the near future.

Mr. Phillips said that all plots are occupied and there is a waiting list.

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger said that Highways had advised that the situation with the Eastgate Street drain had been resolved.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Mr. Smith reported that the new mains situation had been finalised. The renewal contract with CGM for 2023 has been agreed. The Football Club has asked for one roll of the pitch to be carried out and the Clerk will approach the contactors to establish whether this can be done.

Call for Sites Update - Breckland Council

Mr. Rayner reported on the meeting held at the Pavilion on 31st March and attended by George Freeman M.P. CANT has been restarted and thanks were expressed to Messrs Borrett and Bambridge who, in addition to Mr. Freeman, expressed strong objections to the proposition of a new town or village on the site near North Elmham. Every home in the village and surrounding parishes is to receive a leaflet with the key question being number 13. The request is that this should be answered "No". Mr. Borrett stressed that the key item is the "Issues and Options" as there is no other alternative site. The principle of a new town needs to be removed.

Pavilion Funding

There is currently one source of funding for new village halls and that is the National Lottery. Mr. Labouchere mentioned that the Public Works Loan Board is still offering loans at relatively low interest rates. Mr. Bambridge said that when an application is made it is important to include everything that is needed.

King's Coronation Celebrations

Arrangements are proceeding as planned. An advert is to be placed in Elmham News.

Archive Group Records

Mr. Smith has visited Mrs. Woodhouse and viewed the material to be archived.

He is confident that it can be housed in the Institute building with some purpose built wardrobes/cupboards (probably three) needed. Mr. Smith is to obtain some quotations.

Report from County/District Councillor

Mr. Bambridge and Mr. Borrett answered questions and gave their views on the proposal for the curiously named "Railway Village". They are both completely opposed to it and will continue to press the matter at Breckland Council. The Local Plan and forthcoming local elections were also discussed.

BUSY BEES

For the beekeeper, this is a very busy time. The hives should be inspected on a weekly basis to make sure the queen is laying. With the longer days and a more plentiful food supply she can lay up to 1000 eggs a day. It is also very important to check for queen cells as when a queen cell is sealed, the old queen could swarm with up to 75% of the workers. Not only does a swarm present problems for everyone but with most of the workers gone there is no honey produced by that hive.

Worker Bee

The workers are all females and they hatch from the smallest cells in the hive. They hatch from the cell in approximately 21 days. The first 6–10 days is spent in general hive cleaning. The next phase in their lives is spent attending to the queen who they feed and preen as her only job is to lay eggs. Their next tasks include honey processing and wax production. They then take on the role of hive guard bees before finally becoming a flying worker bee and its life will end if its lucky to survive 8 weeks. it is said in its lifetime it will produce approximately a teaspoon

of honey. A worker has a barbed sting and will die if it uses its sting.

Drones

Drones hatch from the next biggest cells. These are all male and are only produced in the spring and summer. The drones are ejected from the colony in the autumn as their primary role is to mate with new queens. As they play no part in food production the workers throw them out once their job is done for that year. Drones have no stings.

Queens

The queen cell is the largest in the hive. The difference between a worker and a queen is the queen cell is filled with much more Royal Jelly which leads to accelerated growth. The queen produces a pheromone which informs the colony there is a viable queen in the colony and all is well. If she leaves the colony the bees quickly become agitated and will start preparations to produce a new queen.

In the next week or two the first of this season's honey will be capped and ready for removal. More of this another time!

MY JOURNEY WITH BREAST CANCER

Having passed the magical age of 70, I am no longer automatically invited to attend a three yearly mammogram. Covid played its part and after my husband told me he had seen a poster at the surgery about mammogram appointments, I realised it was four and a half years since my last one so I made a routine appointment for 30th January. A week later the letter arrived inviting me back for more tests. Not all women who are called back will receive a cancer diagnosis but on 9th February, after a second mammogram, an ultrasound and a biopsy I was told I definitely had breast cancer. On 14th February, as well as receiving a beautiful bunch of roses, I also had an appointment to see the surgeon. He examined me again and confirmed I had a small tumour which should be removed, and the likelihood was I would need follow up treatment of radiotherapy and hormone tablets. Strangely, I felt very lucky the cancer had been detected in the early stages and this feeling has stayed with me throughout my journey so far.

Wednesday 15th March, just six weeks after my first mammogram, was the day of my surgery. During a day procedure the tumour was removed and a biopsy of the lymph nodes was taken.

For the next three weeks I took things easy, but I did the exercises as advised by the hospital and I took short walks. I felt very tired, I still feel tired, and rested frequently during the day. I have had

very little discomfort and have been lucky enough not to need any painkillers. I developed a swelling close to the site of the surgery and after a call from our surgery to the hospital I was given an appointment for a checkup two weeks earlier than planned. The swelling was confirmed to be a Seroma, a collection of fluid which will be absorbed back into the body in time. The surgeon was then able to give me the results from the surgery. The good news was the tumour had been successfully removed and the lymph nodes were clear. I need a short course of radiotherapy and I will take hormone tablets for the next 5 years and have annual check ups.

As I write this, I am waiting for my five day course of radiotherapy to begin on 17th May.

I am so grateful to the amazing staff at the hospital, to our surgery and to all the follow up calls and support from specialist cancer nurses. There is a massive network of help and support, and contact details are made available to all patients. My friends, family and particularly my husband, have all given me invaluable support and have helped to keep me feeling positive and have held my hand each step of the way.

So, ladies, when you receive the invitation to have a mammogram, please attend. If you are over 70, please request your 3 yearly mammogram. The vast majority of you will be fine but if, like me, you do receive a cancer diagnosis, then thank your lucky stars it has been detected and you have the opportunity to receive the treatment you need.

NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

The diversity of colour among our wildlife is extraordinary, but it's fair to say that some colours are better represented than others. Most of our mammals are brown or grey, though in varying shades, and there are so many brown birds that they even have a slightly derogatory collective term, "little brown jobs". Moths have an amazing variety of colours and patterns, yet brown is still the predominant colour. Of the thousands of different beetles we have, there must be more that are either brown or black than all of the rest put together. But while browns and blacks might dominate, most groups of animals have plenty of more colourful representatives as well. The whole colour palette is well represented in our natural world with red, yellow, green, whites, pink, orange, purple and everything in between. One colour is less common than all the others though – blue. Even among the groups of animals that show the greatest diversity in colour, blue is a relatively rare colour. So this month I'm going to showcase some examples of blue in our wildlife.

Starting with birds, we are lucky that two of our commonest garden birds are blue, or at least have a substantial amount of blue in their plumage. Lucky, because in the family of tits (about 65 species worldwide) the vast majority are some variation of brown, black and white. Our Blue Tit (photo 1) is one of our prettiest birds and can be enjoyed by almost anyone who has space for a bird feeder in their garden. Great Tits' colours are dominated by their black-and-white head, yellow underparts and green back, but their wings and tail are distinctly blue too (photo 2). A few birds have blue-black plumage, often iridescent so that in some lights they look black but when the light catches them they look blue - like Rook and the upperparts of Swallow and House Martin. But truly blue birds are unusual and the only other one we're likely to encounter round North Elmham is the Kingfisher. Round here you're most likely

to see these along the river or perhaps the dyke that runs alongside the railway, but they occasionally wander further – one flew over my garden in Eastgate Street once. I rarely get a chance to photograph them here so my picture (photo 3) is one I took up the road at Great Ryburgh a few years ago. Another common bird here, the Jay, is not predominantly blue but it has a striking blue patch in its wing (photo 4).

Butterflies are well known for being colourful but only one group of butterflies here is blue. There are two species of blue butterfly that you're likely to see round North Elmham –the Holly Blue and the Common Blue. The Holy Blue is the one most of us are likely to see in our gardens (there's one in my garden as I write) and is easily separated from Common Blue by its pale whitish blue underwings and broad black border to the blue upperwings (photo 5). Common Blue is more likely to be seen in open grassland, but sadly not nearly as abundantly as it used to be just a few years ago. Males have almost completely blue upperwings (photo 6) but their underwings are pale brown with black-and-white spots and a row of orange spots.


If you flick through a book on moths you might see more colour and variety than you expect, but you will struggle to find blue. There's one moth that has blue in its name, the Blue-bordered Carpet, but although it's quite a pretty moth its name is quite an exaggeration as the rear border to its wings has only the vaguest blueish tint (photo 7). One moth that does have true blue on it is the Clifden Nonpareil. It's sometimes called the Blue Underwing because its hindwing has a broad blue band across it. It's a huge and magnificent moth but it's not common. I was privileged to catch one in my garden in 2021 (photo 8) which was the best ever year for this normally rare species in Norfolk. Prior to 2019 this species was extremely rare but it appears to have colonised, though it remains to be seen if they have really established themselves here or if it was just a temporary colonisation.

Many of our beetles are dark-coloured or black but some of these are quite metallic in colour with blue, purple or green reflections. I don't think there are any species that are matt blue – at least I can't think of any – but metallic blue-black beetles are relatively frequent. On some, like the Prussian Plate-jaw (photo 9) the upperparts are shiny blue-black, but few are so blue that you'd describe them as blue rather than blue-black. Perhaps the closest are a group of leaf beetles in the genus Altica (photo 10). There are several species that are really difficult to tell apart but I often see them in ditch-side vegetation along the footpath running between County School and the Cathedral Meadows. One of the common species feeds on Great Willowherb which grows plentifully along there.

Perhaps the group of insects where blue is least unusual is the dragonflies. Some of the larger hawkers have lots of blue spots on the body and on the largest dragonfly in Norfolk, the Emperor Dragonfly, males have a blue abdomen. Several of our commonest damselflies are mostly blue – especially the Azure Damselfly and very similar Common Blue Damselfly (photo 11). The Banded Demoiselle (pictured in last July's issue) can be abundant along the River Wensum and males have a blue-green body and a large blue-black patch in the wings.

Blue is a slightly commoner colour among our wildflowers. Bluebells are a favourite in ancient woodland and several species of forget-me-not and speedwell can be found easily round our village, such as the Water Forget-me-not (photo 12) that grows in the dyke beside the railway.

1953 CORONATION MEMORIES

My Uncle Bob was a member of the Magic Circle and an amateur Puppeteer and performed shows in Kingston upon Hull and area at weekends. He was booked for 3 shows on The Day and he, my auntie Sis and I duly entertained at two Street Parties in the afternoon and one in the evening in a big Church Hall. Just before we went off to work, I watched the 9" black and white TV Grandad had with great excitement. Thinking back, it was as big as an Ipad today.

My Auntie did the music, records of course, and she had to be absolutely accurate when putting the music on; I took the marionettes, which were about 2 foot 6 inches (78.2 cm), out of their padded bags, untwisted the strings and held them ready for Uncle Bob to use. His deft control of them made then very realistic but the one I remember most was the Skeleton which exploded into all the relevant bones as the music, "The leg bone's connected to the hip bone" etc was played. The audiences were always delighted, and we usually had encores which meant I had to have a spare marionette ready. I was 13 but felt very responsible for our performers as a twisted string in the wrong place could cause major havoc.

I had three Coronation teas that day and half a crown for my wages, but I was very content.

THE RISE OF NORFOLK COUNTY SCHOOL

Members of the Norfolk Agricultural Association meeting at Lynn were surprised and gratified by the offer of Edward, Prince of Wales, to lay the foundation stone of the new school at North Elmham. He would be at Sandringham at Easter and come to Elmham on Easter Monday 1873.

The school was intended to provide an excellent education for middle class boys, particularly the sons of farmers. Its founder was Rev. Joseph Lloyd Brereton, Rector of Little Massingham.

When living in Devon, he had established the first County School, a boarding school, which provided a liberal and religious education for boys from families of moderate means.

Returning to Norfolk in 1867, he was approached by local landowners who proposed a County School in Norfolk.

Lord Leicester, Lord Lieutenant of Norfolk, offered to be its president.

Messrs John Gales & Gough, London architects, drew up plans. The builder, Robert Skipper of East Dereham, submitted an estimate of £800 for the work. He forecast that, in spite the wet weather, the building would be completed in the course of a year. In that, he was correct.

The weather on Easter Monday, 14 April 1873 was perfect, in contrast to the chilly and overcast skies of the previous days. At midday the Prince and Princess of Wales embarked on a special train at Wolferton Station accompanied by the Bishop of Norwich, the Earl of Leicester and many others. Disembarking at Elmham Station, the party was greeted by Lord and Lady Sondes.

Carriages drawn by four grey horses, took the guests through the village where Lord Sondes' gardener, Mr Smythe, had, according to the Norwich Mercury, transformed the village street 'into an avenue filled with foliage and blooms, rare hothouse flowers, evergreens and a great number of flags suspended in festoons from poles erected on either side of the road'. Church bells rang out and a flag fluttered from the tower. The way was thickly lined with spectators.

A section of the 3rd Norfolk Volunteers provided a guard of honour for the royal party. Massed behind them was the band of the Norfolk Artillery Militia. Trustees of the project wearing red carnations in their coats formed a welcoming party. Their Highnesses were photographed by Mr Brunton of Dereham as a memorial of the occasion. The schoolboys and their masters were lined up in front of the foundation stone. The Norwich Mercury told its readers that the Princess 'frequently bowed in return for salutations' and the Prince 'shook hands very warmly with many noblemen and gentlemen he knew'.

Rev. Joseph Brereton said his aim was to raise the standard of education in Norfolk, reduce its costs and prepare boys for a well-informed and active life.

Prince Edward's said he was gratified to know that he, a landowner, was supporting a project primarily focussed on the agricultural community. He was handed a silver and ivory trowel and an ebony mallet by the architect. A glass bottle containing the aims of the school, names of the trustees, architects, builders and a copy of the day's Times newspaper, was placed in the cavity and the stone was lowered into place.

Lunch followed in a huge marquee decorated in scarlet and white. On leaving, the Prince and Princess made a brief stop at Elmham Hall and then returned to Sandringham.

The school, opened in July 1874, stood on an eminence in 35 acres with the River Wensum forming part of the boundary. The building of flint with red brick

dressings had a roof of red and black banded tiles. Large windows overlooked the surrounding countryside. On the ground floor, a large hall served as a meeting place. Galleries running round the first and second floors overlooked the hall and led to classrooms, a library, masters' common room, dormitories, kitchen, dining room and servants' quarters.

Fees were to be 40 guineas a year and the older boys would be prepared for university entrance or professional examinations, with tuition in English, Maths, French, Latin, Science, Greek, German and Drawing.

A substantial house for the Headmaster was situated to the north-east of the main building. The second master's house on the south-west of the site could also be used as an infirmary. In the grounds were cricket and rugby pitches, with boating on the Wensum and a large swimming pool on the riverbank

Everything seemed to be in excellent order for the success of the school.



WENSUM VALLEY BIRDWATCHING SOCIETY

Spring is always an exciting and busy time for birdwatchers. This year there is a full program of outdoor visits, starting at the end of March with a trip to Sculthorpe Moor nature reserve near Fakenham. Here the changeover of seasons was illustrated by the presence of Redwings - departing winter visitors - and a single Swallow, the first of the year for many. This very accessible reserve now includes an extensive Beaver enclosure, although the Beavers themselves are not seen by day, and a new hide overlooking a large scrape where Little Ringed Plovers, Redshank and Snipe could be seen. This looks very promising as a site for passage and resident waders in future. The group visit to Lackford Lakes in April got off to a wonderful start with excellent views of singing Nightingales. These elusive birds always present a challenge – you can stand in front of a bush where one is singing without being able to catch a glimpse! When we finally moved on, we went past the visitor centre to the viewing platform (6) where Sedge Warblers were singing. At the double decker hide (5) there were Teal, Tufted Duck, Ovstercatcher and Cormorant along with nesting Canada Geese and Coots. A pair of Greylag Geese already had a brood of half a dozen goslings, while overhead a passing Marsh Harrier was seen carrying prey, so very likely it was breeding too. Ash Carr gave good views of female Blackcap, Marsh Tit, Coal Tit and a Nuthatch. Heading towards Steggall's Hide (12) past Plover Pool we heard and saw Cetti's Warblers as well as a Chiffchaff with a feather in its bill disappearing into low-growing vegetation by the path. We turned north to take the path to Fullers Mill Hide (8) where there was a Little Egret while at Bess's Hide (9) there were a couple of pairs of Little Grebes, lots of Black-headed Gulls and

two Hobbies overhead hawking insects. Early May brought a dawn chorus visit to Pensthorpe, a popular outing in spite of the early hour, that ended with a breakfast at the centre. Full accounts of indoor and outdoor meetings can be found on the website at WVBS.co.uk

MORE 2 LIFE CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP

It has distressed me to see the level of violence in our local high schools recently. What has shocked me more is to see that some adults condone the beating up of pupils by their peers, with the added touch

of filming it as some kind of trophy to post on social media - creating 'entertainment' out of someone else's suffering.

Some of the comments by adults have been that they should be left to carry on beating someone up because that is 'life'. I was astonished by this comment. Violence only breeds violence. We can only look around the world to see that.

In scripture, we are told of many incidents of violence which escalates into greater violence. For Jacob, for example, it started with relatively petty incidents, but it grows through his children into full blown physical attacks and the deaths of a whole people. (Gen. 34).

There is an antidote to violence. We can choose a different path. We don't have to condone or partake in such behaviour. Jesus teaches a different way. Not a way of being a doormat, but teaching strength through love, grace, and mercy.

For those affected by these attacks, Jesus truly understands your pain. He too experienced humiliation and physical abuse at the hands of His contemporaries, being publicly beaten, falsely accused, and publicly executed in one of the most barbaric ways possible on the cross.

But thank God, He did not stay dead. There is hope. He is alive forever more. You can come to Him as one who 'gets it'. For the perpetrators, those directly or passively involved, you have a choice. You can choose a different path. Jesus can help you with that also.


