NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 3RD APRIL, 2024

The following information is taken from the DRAFT PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community Website, once approved.

Councillors present were: Mr. M. Phillips (Chair of the Meeting), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. P.Grainger, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. J. Labouchere and Mr. C. Smith.

Also in attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk)and Mr. B. Borrett (County & District Councillor).

Apologies for absence: Mrs. J. Borgnis, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor)

Updated Information and Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: The cutting of trees has been completed. Two, near Eastgate Street, were rotten and, as a result, were given additional attention. A letter was received from a parishioner regarding nests but we are able to confirm that the contractor checked these and there were no eggs present. A licence was issued by the Tree Warden. The cutting of the trees was also essential for health and safety reasons as there was a real danger to people from falling branches. Mr. Phillips is to draft a letter to the parishioner who had raised the query.

Mr. Grainger said that a reminder had been sent to Highways regarding the matter concerning the cycleway. A response to the original request, which was made some time ago, is still outstanding. **Cathedral Meadows:** A quotation is to be obtained for a replacement to the map that had been wrenched off its base.

Broom Green: Mr. Labouchere reported that the road had been flooded on 11th March as the result of a blocked drain.

Millennium Wood & Jubilee Wood: The fence around the pit has been replaced.

Allotments

The mirror from Fulmodeston and Barney Parish Council is no longer available.

Highway Matters

Mr. Grainger said that reports regarding potholes have been acknowledged and the response times are improving. Potholes near the level crossing and at the Pound have been repaired.

Details of the two fatal accidents which occurred in the village in 2022 have been received from the Project Engineer (Network Safety), Community and Environmental Services, Norfolk County Council. These are as follows:-

a) 21st August 2022 – a westbound driver on B1145 overshot the junction with B1110 in dark conditions and struck a southbound motorcyclist. The motorcyclist suffered a fatal injury.

b) 17th September 2022 – a southbound driver on B1110 lost control at a river bridge 100 metres south of Spong Farm in dark conditions. The car left the carriageway to the nearside and collided with a tree, resulting in a fatal injury to the nearside front seat passenger.

Following these tragic fatal accidents, both locations were investigated by a Road Safety Engineer.

At the B1145/B1110 site, no highway factors were identified beyond verge maintenance.

At the B1110 bridge site, it was identified that some warning signs were missing,

road markings were worn and a bridge pilaster was damaged. As a result of this inspection, road markings were refreshed, and SLOW markings were added on each approach. Some signing amendments and hazard marker posts were installed on the bridge. Vegetation was cut back from around a sign assembly and the bridge pilaster was repaired.

Pavilion and Playing Field

The skate ramp and kick board will cost £800 and £500, the expenditure having been previously agreed. A cutting schedule of all areas has been provided by the contractors, Nurture.

Brookside Development Update

A meeting is to be arranged with the developers regarding drainage issues.

Archive Group Records

Two quotations are still awaited and will be chased *Eds Note:* This is for cupboards and shelving to store all the archive material in the Memorial Hall.

S106 monies (£15.1K) received from Breckland Council

Messrs Phillips and Rayner have visited the Play Area on the Village Green and are of the opinion that a two metre enclosing strip, totalling about 60 square metres, would be a useful addition to the facility. The cost would be about £4,770. A drawing is to be produced for members to consider. A precise quotation will be obtained.

Report from District and/or County Councillors

Mr. Borrett said that Norfolk County Council had been in discussion with Natural England regarding a bat licence for the Norwich Western Link route for some 18 months. A draft report was due on 29th February. On 8th March, some new criteria were produced by Natural England regarding bats and it is not certain who has actually formulated the new reports. The County Council has spent almost £40m on the project so far. The Government has started to repay this money.

Service Centre villages will be allocated a small proportion of new housing needed under the Breckland Local Plan. 2,000 houses are required, and three sites have been proposed, one being Swanton Morley Barracks. Other sites are at Larling (near A11) and on the south side of Dereham, near Scarning.

The annual three day, all night rave at Sennowe Park which is licensed by Breckland Council was mentioned and it is known that a number of concerns have been voiced about the possibility of the disruption suffered by some nearby villages being repeated this year. Mr. Bambridge has full details and is making enquiries regarding the arrangements.



BRECKLAND DRAFT LOCAL PLAN

New Consultation

Breckland District Council has announced the latest consultation for their emerging Local Plan, which will give residents their first opportunity to comment on sites which have been suggested for housing. Unfortunately, this opportunity has only been given after Breckland has decided which of the proposed sites to put into the draft Plan as their "preferred" ones.

Two sites have been "preferred" for North Elmham: one for 10 houses off (lower) Back Lane, and one for 30 houses behind and to the south of (lower) Eastgate Street. Further details of these and of the other sites put forward in the Call for Sites can be viewed on Breckland's Commonplace website for the Local Plan at: https:// brecklandlocalplan.commonplace.is. Although these two sites have been preferred at this stage, they are not yet set in stone, so comments on these and the other potential sites can be made, as well as comments on other aspects of the draft Local Plan. If residents feel strongly about any of the sites, make these thoughts known through the consultation.

North Elmham as a designated Local Service Centre will have to have some new housing during the period of the new Local Plan, with thinking currently being that most growth will be focussed in the market towns, which will receive about 75% of the new housing across the District. This figure for new housing in North Elmham is 40 new houses over the Plan period to 2046.

The consultation has been announced to run from 3rd June to 15th July, with a local drop-in event at Dereham Leisure Centre on 3rd June, with additional events on Zoom on 5th (12.30pm – 2.00pm) and 17th June (6.30pm – 8.00pm) and 3rd July (6.30pm – 8.00pm.)

Residents will also be able to comment on other aspects of the draft Local Plan, one of these being on the proposal to remove settlement boundaries, to allow some new development outside existing boundaries, subject to a range of criteria, which would be in addition to any allocated sites covered above. The Parish Council and many others were concerned about this proposal and commented accordingly in earlier

consultations. In the first consultation in 2023, 53% of those responding to the question about settlement boundaries said they wanted them to remain, with 21% wanting them removed. In the consultation earlier this year, guestion 2 asked whether Breckland should "continue with a settlement boundary approach or develop a criteria-based policy", with 69% of the respondents to that question saying that settlement boundaries should be continued, with 26% in favour of developing a criteria-based policy. Despite these clear majorities in favour of keeping settlement boundaries, Breckland has decided to remove them and adopt a criteria-based approach in the draft Local Plan: it makes one wonder what is the purpose of consultations?!

One positive to come out of previous consultations is that the proposal for a new town in Bintree, Billingford and North Elmham has not been put into the draft Local Plan: good news indeed!

The Parish Council will discuss its response to the new consultation at their meeting on 3rd June, with this being finalised at the July meeting.

AURORA BOREALIS

On Friday 10th May and into Saturday 11th much of the UK was treated to a celestial sight. It's not often that we get to see the Aurora Borealis, also more commonly known as the Northern Lights, in Norfolk but sometimes we get to share in something special that is usually only visible in regions close to the Earth's magnetic poles. If you missed it, you probably woke up on Saturday morning to tv reports and social media sites full of amazing photos.

This aurora being visible so far away from the poles was due to one of the strongest solar storms in 20 years. According to information from NASA the Aurora Borealis is caused when charged particles from the sun collide with Earth's atmosphere, striking gases, causing them to heat up and glow. These particles follow the Earth's magnetic field lines as they dive into our atmosphere in a "ring" around the poles called the auroral oval. The colours seen depend on the type of gas (oxygen and nitrogen) they hit and the altitude.

So what did I see when I went outside in the garden? Well in Eastgate Street we do have quite a bit of light pollution, so not completely dark, which is what you really want. However, I could see a strobing effect and the diagonal lines as seen on the opposite page, just not the depth of colour. The sky definitely had a green and pink hue, but when I looked through the camera on my phone what a difference! The sensors on my smartphone (as you can see in the photos) detected a broader spectrum of light and colour than my eyes could. But either way it was an event I was glad to witness.

If you are like me and are interested in the night sky I can recommend following Adrian West aka VirtualAstro on social media sites such as Facebook, X and Instagram, he keeps his followers informed of many things from International Space Station passes, meteor showers and the Northern Lights. It was his aurora alert on X that made me get up, go outside and take a look at the night sky, and I wasn't disappointed.

The sun is very active at the moment, heading to its peak in an eleven year cycle. There could be another chance to see the northern lights in North Elmham but as we go through the summer our skys are naturally lighter and we may have to stay up very late to witness anything. However, there are also chances to see shooting stars with the best display being the Perseid meteor shower which is active between 17th July and 24th August. The shower will peak 12–13th August. So maybe we could be lucky with clear night then to witness them?

TRADE & DIY WELCOME

COUNTY SCHOOL

County School station sits squarely between North Elmham and Broom Green, a strange location for guite a large three-platform railway station. Originally it was going to be built in Broom Green - serving as the junction station for the branch to Wroxham - but a generous offer from the founders of the Norfolk County School, later the Watts Naval School, saw the station and junction moved one mile southwards of its planned location in order to best serve the needs of the school. This lasted until 1964, when the passenger service ended - although the line remained in use for goods trains for another 20 years.

Since 1999, the station and the railway line have been owned and managed by the Mid-Norfolk Railway Preservation Trust. This charity owns the entire railway between Wymondham and County School, with our core charitable aim of preserving and operating the line and associated structures. The scheme started in 1974 with Railway Development Society meeting in Dereham that presented a petition for the line to be reopened between Wymondham and Fakenham.

Since 1987, the station has operated as a visitor attraction, initially featuring full-size train rides. In 1989, the society became the MNRPT charity and moved the focus of our operations to Dereham - soon restoring the 11.5 mile Wymondham to Dereham section of line. County School was then briefly operated by another company, until the entire line from Wymondham to County School was purchased, in stages, by the charity and the required legal powers to restore and operate the entire line were awarded.

Presently, County School opens at weekends as a visitor centre, museum and tearoom. Over the last three years we've been delighted to see more and more people visiting us and expressing supportive interest in the railway project. Many of these people have also enjoyed walking along the paths that we provide under an access agreement between ourselves and Breckland District Council and appreciated our ongoing efforts to develop the biodiversity of our property.

South from the station, a footpath runs alongside the railway line, linking to North Elmham via the public footpath from the church. An additional section of the railway can also be explored, as far as the start of the tracks at the former Elmham station. Northwards, our path is open to cyclists and horse riders, connecting to a Public Bridleway that links to Broom Green and the National Cycle Network. We're delighted that these paths, maintained by our volunteers, are enjoyed by a growing number of people and we continue to see them as core attractions for our business. As such, we have already spent several thousand pounds improving them, and our plans for the restoration of the railway tracks have always included their retention.

Although we don't run full-sized trains at County School just yet, we are delighted to be the home of the Wensum Valley Miniature Railway, who now provide public rides behind their diminutive, but powerful, live steam and electric locomotives several times a year. The WVMR is owned and operated by the North Norfolk Model Engineering Club, who have decades of experience, having previously operated

lines at Holt and Aylsham, and their rides are already proving very popular with visitors. The station is also included in some of the MNR's special events, such as

25 YEAR CAREER WITH THE YHA

We had many lovely groups and people staying with us during our career. Like the children from a school for the profoundly deaf, who came most years. I would take them on a nature ramble within the hostel grounds. It was a joy to see the look on their faces when I pointed out a nuthatch nest hole in a tree and showed them a picture of the bird. Or when I crushed the leaf of Jack by the Hedge, (a member of the garlic family), and got them to sniff it.

Every year in September, we had a group from a school in Gloucester for four nights. Every child starting at the school would come to us within a week or two of starting. This gave the children an opportunity to get to know each other and the teachers, and the teachers to get to know the children. A great idea I always thought.

On the other hand! We had a young adult club from inner London. They asked if they could fish in the river. I got permission from the gillie, providing they didn't fly fish. Couldn't have them accidentally catching a salmon! They turned up with all the fishing gear and seemed to have had a good time. On their departure Eileen went into the dormitory they had used to clean up. It was a dormitory in an annexe, and it was the last time it was to be used before we shut it down over Winter. She noticed some maggots on one of the beds and thought that they had been accidentally spilled. Unfortunately, not the case. The darlings had stuffed maggots into the pillowcases, duvets and mattress covers. They were everywhere. All hands to the pump, and we spent the next two hours hunting down herds of maggots. Finally, we thought we had got them all, and shut the room for the winter. Come Spring, we opened up to find hundreds (maybe thousands, we didn't count them), of dead blue bottles all over the room. We had obviously missed many of the maggots, which had pupated and hatched, and had ultimately been killed by the winter cold. Another clear up job! Fortunately, this sort of behaviour was very rare.

After eight years at Welsh Bicknor, with its special problems, we were tired and needed a change, so we applied for a smaller hostel.

ELMHAM WILDLIFE

Animals are often coloured in such a way that they blend in to their environment. Camouflage lets them hide from their predators so increases their chances of being eaten. There is so much green vegetation in the natural environment that you might expect a lot of our animals to be green. There are a few green animals, but perhaps not as many as we might imagine.

Of all the hundreds of different moths we have in North Elmham (well over 1,000 species in fact) only a handful are green but among these are some of my favourite moths so in a month when I don't have time to think too hard about what to write I thought I would showcase some of these beautiful green moths.

Perhaps our commonest green moth is the Green Carpet (photo 1). It's a species that you may well see when you're going for an evening walk as they often start flying well before it's really dark. The Green Pug (photo 2) is another common species that comes to light. When fresh these are nice and green but the green quickly wears off leaving a much browner insect.

The Common Emerald (photo 3) is, as its name suggests, common, but the Small Emerald (photo 4) is a little scarcer. Despite its name, it's actually slightly bigger than the Common Emerald, but the Large Emerald (photo 5) is aptly named as it is one of our largest moths. All three are regular visitors to the moth trap I run in my garden.

Flying later in the year than any of the other moths mentioned here is the Merveille du Jour (photo 6). It's a favourite of many moth-trappers but my personal favourite is the Green Silver-



lines (photo 7). Sadly this is a moth that is in sharp decline – I caught nine here between 2015 and 2019 but I haven't caught any more since then. The Scarce Silver-lines (photo 8) is superficially similar but another close relative, the Cream-bordered Green Pea (photo 9) is quite a different moth, not least because of its tiny size.

Cream-bordered Green Pea isn't much bigger than the micro moth, Green Oak Tortrix (photo 10), and the two species are often confused by novice moth trappers. Like many insects Green Oak Tortrix have good and bad years. Last year there was a glut and I caught over 50 in my garden, more than ever before. Another year I didn't catch a single one all year. These cycles of good and bad years can mask the long-term trend of moth populations.

The Green Arches (photo 11) is quite a scarce species but I occasionally catch one in North Elmham. When fresh they are bright green and are one of our smartest moths. The green colour fades and eventually they become a relatively nondescript brown moth. The one shown here is the brightest I've found in North Elmham so far but I've seen fresher individuals elsewhere that were just stunning.

WIVES PLUS ALL

At Wives Plus All's meeting in the Memorial Hall on Thursday 9th May, Trevor Howlett, Vice Chairman and Jackie Noy both of the East Coast Trucker's gave a DVD presentation and talk about the Truckers voluntary work in the Special Needs community here in East Anglia.

East Coast Truckers were originally formed by a group of East Anglian Truckers getting together to support drivers who were caught and prosecuted for using C.B. Radios. However, legalisation of the use of C.B's led to the Truckers helping others and an outing was arranged one weekend in conjunction with Special Needs Schools to give their scholars the unique opportunity to ride in a truck cab. This was the beginning of the famous August Bank Holiday Convoy of Truckers and their lorries taking children with special needs out in the countryside and along the coast. Now totally supported by authorities, with road closures police escorts and all emergency services and their vehicles attending The East Coast Trucker's Convoy on August Bank Holiday with now over 40 trucks is thought to be the only one in the world.

The East Coast Trucker's Charity has grown because of the kindness of a substantial legacy given to them which means that in the present day the Truckers have become involved in respite care and currently have a caravan at California Cliffs, which is fully adapted for wheelchair users' use, and a chalet at Summerfields Holiday Park, both situated in Scratby and offered to families for a refundable deposit with free entertainment access. In liaison with the relevant local Occupational Therapists, Families, Schools and Hospitals apply to the Truckers for equipment such as wheelchairs, special books and other items not covered by Social Services. The Truckers can also now arrange extra outings for youngsters up to the age of 16 and their families to other

interesting community venues such as a local Zoo, the Hippodrome Circus, Norfolk Railways and etc.

Thanks go to Jackie and Trevor for a very interesting and informative talk of the Truckers' voluntary work in East Anglia.

AN OASIS OF CALM

We are blessed in North Elmham by areas of green space: Cathedral Meadow, Jubilee Green, the playing field, the allotments... which we can all enjoy in a variety of ways.

There is something rather special, however, about St Mary's Churchyard. Precious, of course, to those who have loved ones buried there, finding time to refresh flowers, pause, remember and reflect.

As Rector, I'm quite often committing the departed to their final resting place, but I'm always struck by the peace and beauty of this space. When not 'on duty' I like to sit on the bench to enjoy the sunshine and think about the history of our village represented by those who are laid to rest here.

Churchyards are special places and important to the environment, as they never have fertiliser or chemicals sprayed on them, providing a protected habitat for wildlife.

The management of the churchyard, however, is becoming a pressing issue for St Mary's Parochial Church Council. We are very grateful to Derek Shoesmith, who has faithfully maintained the 'old' churchyard for so many years but has decided that the time has come to stand down.

The cost of grass-cutting alone of the entire churchyard for 2024 is $\pm 3,710$, plus control of brambles, weeds and ivy (and occasional tree surgery). North Elmham Parish Council has agreed to contribute $\pm 1,500$ for 2024.

The churchyard is, of course, the village 'cemetery' and you may feel that the Parish Council should maintain it; however, they are not obliged to do so.

St Mary's is funded voluntarily by 15 people, with many financial demands facing them. Maintaining the churchyard cannot be a priority for their very limited resources. The PCC is looking at how to minimise costs, which will mean reducing the area being cut; however, it is still unaffordable.
