A BEHIND THE SCENES AT ELMHAM FETE

Many of you reading this will have enjoyed yet another fabulous Elmham Fete on the 18th of May. But what you might not realise is just how much planning, time, and dedication goes into delivering those four and a half hours of fun, food, and festivities.

The Fete Committee first met back in January—a team of volunteers, each responsible for a different part of the day. From organising refreshments and recruiting servers, to writing to companies for sponsorship of major costs like the beer tent, the band, the bouncy castle, and the plant stall, every detail is carefully planned. They also reach out for raffle prize donations.

There's a treasurer keeping track of expenses, someone handling publicity, others coordinating volunteers for stalls and games, and someone booking craft stalls, classic cars, and tractors. Some volunteers put up banners in the weeks leading up to the event, while others liaise with the primary school to arrange the children's prime afternoon slot.

The committee meets several times in the months before the fete, updating each other on progress, working through long todo lists, and solving problems as they arise.

In the final days before the Fete, the pace picks up. Volunteers shop for refreshments, mow and prepare the grounds of Elmham House, and from Friday, begin setting up tents and the Dog Show ring. On Saturday, tables are arranged for refreshments, stalls, bric-abrac, books, ice cream, and more.

Even the hours before the fete opens are a hive of activity—stallholders, classic cars, and tractors are guided into place, the PA system is set up, and cakes, tea, hot dogs, and strawberries are prepped.

12pm—are they ready?

Then, for four and a half hours, the community enjoys the fruits of all that labour. Meanwhile, committee members ensure volunteers are in place and well supported, and that the refreshment tent runs smoothly—especially the allimportant flow of clean cups, thanks to a dedicated washingup team.

And when it's all over... it's not really over

Volunteers stay behind to take everything down, pack up tents, return crockery and tables to the Memorial Hall, pick up litter, and restore the gardens and field for our generous hosts at Elmham House. Then, of course, there's the counting of the money raised to support local community projects.

So, thank you for coming to the Fete! Now that you know what goes into making it happen, if you see a call for help next year, please consider giving just an hour of your time—whether it's helping on a game, a stall, or with refreshments. Every little bit helps, and the more people who pitch in, the lighter the load for everyone.

Your committee members will be back again in January to do it all over again.

East Anglia based soprano Rosamund Walton will take centre stage as the soloist in Will Todd's vibrant and jazz-infused Mass in Blue at Fakenham Choral Society's 2025 summer concert on Saturday 21st June.

Rosamund is a critically acclaimed professional soprano and choral conductor whose career has seen her perform in many of the major concert venues of Britain and Europe working with orchestras such as the English Chamber orchestra, the London Mozart Players and Norwich Baroque. Now based in East Anglia she maintains a busy performance schedule from intimate recitals to full scale oratorios and opera both with voice and baton.

Choir chairman Rosemary Dear commented: "Rosamund has sung with us a number of times, most recently in last summer's performance of 'Pirates of Penzance' and the soloist parts of Verdi's requiem at our 'Come and Sing' in March this year. We're delighted that she will be performing with us again".

Mass in Blue is a dynamic setting of the Latin mass which blends classical choral singing with the vibrant rhythms and harmonies of jazz. A jazz trio together with piano, a solo soprano voice and a strong choral line weave together to give an energetic and uplifting musical experience.

In contrast, the choir will also perform sacred music from earlier eras, including works by Bach, Fauré, and Brahms, showcasing Europe's rich choral heritage.

GARDENING CLUB



WIVES PLUS ALL

On Thursday 8th May Wives Plus All were visited by representatives from Redwings Horse Sanctuary, namely Charlotte, who is Education & Youth Publications Officer and Debbie, who resides in North Elmham, and whose role at Redwings is Rehoming Officer. Redwings Horse Sanctuary headquarters are here in Norfolk, and it has centres in Norfolk, Essex, Warwickshire, Monmouthshire and Scotland, and it cares daily for more than 1500 horses and donkeys rescued from neglect. Also, under its Guardian Scheme, over 700 more rescued horses and donkeys reside in the community.

Redwings came into being through the rescue of a single pony called Sheba, and her recovery inspired the formation of a Sanctuary in 1984 dedicated to saving horses from a life of fear and neglect. From that one life saved, Redwings has grown to become the largest horse welfare charity in the UK. The Sanctuary has a hospital and rehabilitation services along with a specialist team of horse carers, equine vets and vet nurses, Rehoming expertise, and a specialist behaviour team to work with those horses and donkeys who may not have had the best training or start in life. Redwings has become known particularly for its expertise in carrying out large welfare roundup operations and rescues and it is a member of the National Equine Welfare Council.

In 2022 Redwings Horse Sanctuary Charity took on the Stewardship of the historic Anna Sewell House, the birthplace of the "Black Beauty" author in Great Yarmouth, which has proved a wonderful way to continue this incredible lady's legacy for horse welfare.

Redwings Horse Sanctuary near to us at Aylsham has a visitor centre and is always pleased to receive visitors to meet the residents whose lives have been transformed thanks to donation support.

Wives Plus All thank Charlotte and Debbie for an enlightening talk to members about their valuable work at Redwings Horse Sanctuary.

Wives Plus All will meet again on Thursday 12th June 2025 when there will be a walk with Dave Appleton through the wildflower meadow behind the Chapel Ruins here in North Elmham. Please meet at the Chapel Ruins at 6.30pm.

VE DAY 80

What a shame no-one no one thought to motivate the village into doing something significant to remind us of VE Day 80 years ago.

We need to be reminded sometimes of the great debt we owe to those brave young men from here so that they are not forgotten. Perhaps we all felt the War was over in 1945, 80 years ago, so what difference would anything make now...we won the War along with other countries in Europe and beyond, now a long time ago.

What we must never forget is the help we had from other parts of the globe, help to rid the World of that despicable tyrant Hitler, who killed himself rather than face those his troops were fighting.

Thankfully, unlike the First World War when 36 men and 1 woman died from the village, there were only 9 young men who suffered the same fate in the Second World War. Here they are:

Alfred Horstead, Leading Seaman, the first casualty, was a Gunner and was working on a submarine. Together with the rest of the crew he perished on the 1st August 1940, aged 32 years. Herbert Clarke was in the Royal Artillery and was on leave here, but had an accident on the way back to his Unit,on and was killed, 23rd February 1941, aged 21 years.

Charles Card, of the Pioneer Corps,died 26th February 1941 in London when a wall fell on him doing demolition work.

Walter Bartley Anderson of the North Staffordshire Regiment died on 19th July 1944, aged 18 years was buried in France.

Kenneth Snowling, Highland light Infantry,died 6 August 1944, aged 18 years. He lied about his age to join up. He is buried in France.

Edward Millatt of the Queen's Royal Regiment (West Surrey) died 8th August 1944, aged 31 years, and was buried in France.

Frank Longley of the Coldstream Guards died 9th August 1944 aged 21. He is buried in Germany.

Cecil Bartram of the Manchester Regiment, died on the 14th April 1945, aged 20 years,. He was buried in Lower Saxony, Germany.

Percy Frost of the Norfolk Regiment died 21 September 1944, aged 24 years. His final resting place is unknown. However his name is on the Krangi Memorial, in Singapore.

A Life Well Lived

How do you condense 87 remarkable years into a few lines? Luckily, Arthur – or Dad, Granddad, and Great-Granddad to us – left behind notes, memories, and moments that make telling his story just a little easier.

Born at Willow Hall, Little Snoring (one of a pair of modest cottages despite its grand name), Dad was the third child of Eleanor and William. His childhood was shaped by wartime Britain and the nearby Snoring airbase – a source of excitement and fascination, especially from the attic window of Jex Farm, where he spent hours watching aircraft take off on missions, sadly, many never to return.

Dad's schooling began at Little Snoring Primary, followed by Fakenham Grammar School where his first day was memorable as all the new pupils were gathered in the hall. Names were called out and children went off with their respective form teacher. All apart from one child from Snoring left at the end. "Should I be here?" he thought, but all was well as he had been listed as Anthony and not Arthur!

At that same school assembly was a girl named Jane Gilham, who would become his wife 13 years later. Sport featured heavily in dad's school years – cricket, football, and a place on the West Norfolk Under-15s team. He was also one of only eight Norfolk boys chosen to be ball boys for the 1955 FA Cup Final – an event he proudly recalled every year.

Dad left Norfolk for Manchester University to study Biology, while Jane trained as a nurse at Westminster Hospital in London. Whilst in Manchester he was offered a football apprenticeship – with Manchester United no less – but perhaps wisely chose teaching as that same team would soon be devastated by the Munich air disaster. Dad did however attend a one-week trial for the England Under 19s football team, but it was not meant to be.

In 1959, he began his teaching career in London before returning home to Norfolk, eventually becoming Head of Biology in 1973 at Fakenham Grammar – his old school – where he taught for over two decades. In 1962, he married Jane at Fakenham. Andy was born in 1964 and Kathy in 1969. In 1973, they moved to Eastgate Street, North Elmham – the family home for over 50 years.

Dad was much more than a teacher. He served the community in countless ways: Secretary of the Old Fakenhamian Society, Chair of the Mid Norfolk Wildlife Trust, Secretary of North Elmham Cricket Club, School Governor for North Elmham School, Trustee of two North Elmham charities, and a Church Warden for 25 years. He was also a stalwart of the Gardening Club and "Tea at Two", and a regular in badminton, tennis, and bowls. He gave many hours of his time to assist with the organisation of the village Flower Festival and Garden Fete, preparing backdrops and props for Jane's flower arrangements, and for many years both would compose a brain-teasing guiz which was sold at Flower Festival time to add to the fundraising.

Nature was a constant passion. Holidays to Scotland's remote islands and a fascination with moths (complete with a back-garden moth trap) brought him joy and connected him with his grandchildren – from inspecting catches to drawing insects and pond-dipping. Dad never lost his curiosity or care. Whether advising on homework, tracking rugby reports, progress in degree work, commenting on artwork, or watching birds with porridge in hand, he remained deeply engaged in the lives of his grandchildren Laura, Lewis, and Tom – and later, great-grandchildren, Ryan, Freddie, and Felix. He would often be down on the floor helping to build or make something, and even as he got older he wanted to be involved as much as possible with Ryan, Freddie and Felix. There would always be some sort of toy, book or puzzle brought out of the cupboard for the boys to play with.

In the earlier years at Eastgate Street dad kept a section of the garden as a vegetable plot which, for us old enough to remember, would resemble scenes from the programme The Good Life with many homegrown veg and fruit bushes. Young Lewis and Laura developed a taste for homegrown fruit and would often clear the area of anything edible! Eventually this became too much for dad to look after so it was turned into a lawned area. and a greenhouse was introduced where, right up until last year, he potted up many small flowering plants and grown tomatoes, green beans and various unusual veg. You would often find him "pottering" outside.

Music was always such a great part of Jane's life and it frustrated her that he struggled to tap out a rhythm or sing in tune – but dad always supported mum by attending concerts and music events over the years. Laura and Lewis remember that when they had a go at learning to play the keyboard with Grandma and Granddad, they would be baffled by his superior skills only to eventually realise that he would have the keyboard on demo mode and was pretending to play!

His love for Jane endured beyond her final days, during which he cared for her with gentle devotion. After her passing, he showed resilience and independence – gardening, driving, cooking, and living life on his own terms.

Dad became a great friend to his close neighbour Bob, with whom he shared



many afternoons chatting and watching sport of some sort over a cuppa. There is no doubt they had a loyal friendship over the last few years, with Bob sadly passing away just two and a half weeks before Dad. Having lived in Eastgate Street for over 50 years, they both had a great neighbour network around them which has been very comforting for family members.

Dad had a quiet humour and a store of one-liners – "you'd better eat your ice cream before it gets cold" being a family favourite. "Pimply Richard," "where did I put...?" and "drive carefully" became phrases we'll always hear in our hearts.

Above all, dad was a kind, generous, mildmannered man who gave much and asked for little. His life touched so many – as a teacher, neighbour, friend, and family man. Now reunited with his beloved Jane, he leaves behind a legacy of love, quiet strength, and cherished memories.

We'll all miss you, Dad. Keep up the good work.

WENSUM VALLEY BIRDWATCHING SOCIETY

More than once in the early months of this year we found that our proposed outings had to be cancelled because of bad weather - something that really doesn't happen very often. However we are back in the swing of things now, and in late March we decided to visit Snettisham to see the wader spectacular. The RSPB advertises the best days to see the waders at Snettisham and this Saturday was the first in 2025. Needless to say, there were a lot of people attending! We had arranged to meet in the car park at 2.00pm to beat the rush but actually were lucky to find a space before 2.00. The car park was closed shortly after that, and the beach car park alternative was also closed by 3.30! Several of our members had arranged to arrive later or to park elsewhere and in some cases we never did catch up with them.

Abandoning the idea of exploring the bushes round the car park and on the path to the beach we arrived at the shoreline to find the sea looking a very long way away and the wind to be blowing strongly and coldly. By the time we reached the shore we had seen Tufted Ducks, Coots and Mallards on the lagoons and the likes of Buzzard, Red Kite, Greylag and Egyptian Goose and common passerines from the path. Some of us managed to put up telescopes and hold them steady enough to look for waders on the mud flats, reporting Redshanks, Grey Plover and Dunlin among others. We made the decision to cross the main lagoon by the causeway at the halfway point and walk along the more sheltered side to the far hide. From the causeway we were able to view the lagoon in relatively sheltered conditions. The islands tended to each contain a single species, so one had Avocets and another Cormorants, although among the Blackheaded Gulls were a few Mediterranean Gulls. Across the lagoon were groups of Teal and Redshank. The far hide was surprisingly empty and we were

able to take a rest from the wind in seated comfort. Here we were able to see small numbers of Turnstones, Oystercatchers, Shelduck, Ringed Plover and quite a lot more Med Gulls.

At around 4.30 we made our way to the shoreline and found a gap among the crowds. It was amazing how guickly the tide came in, and guite soon small groups of Knot and Oystercatchers were lifting and swirling to move along to the available mud, and the numbers increased to include groups of Bartailed Godwits and Dunlin. Eventually groups of Knot began peeling off and flying over to the lagoon. Shortly before high tide many of us moved into the nearest hide where to our right was the expected 'beach' of Knot and Oystercatchers, the Knot looking just like a grey pebble beach. Amazingly more and more groups of hundreds of Knot kept flying in, circling around and somehow managing to settle in on the same patch of shore. We were told that the latest count of Knot was over 24,000 and I'm sure most of those were packed into this small area! We all agreed that spectacular was the right word. We made it back to the car park in time to admire the lovely sunset sky.

April saw us visit the Norfolk Wildlife trust reserve at Cley, led by Alan who is a volunteer there as well as one of our members. We spent the morning in a leisurely walk around the main part of the reserve, starting with Bishop's Hide. Progress is always slow when there is so much to see, as there always is at Cley, and it was a fairly late lunch stop, after which some members walked the alternative circuit taking in Walsey Hills and the newer Attenborough walk. There will be a full report in our May newsletter, and more in my next update.

April/May is a time when unusual birds often arrive in the area, often on migration. Many members have made the trip over the border into Suffolk this

ELMHAM WILDLIFE







It was great to hear from

some of you after my piece last month, with Michael showing me a photo of a Cockchafer that had come into his house. Cornelia telling me about another local name for Cockchafer, Billy Witch (a name which, I read, may have its origins in Suffolk) and Anna from Worthing telling me how she and her husband have been catching Cockchafers in their moth trap this month. Richard from Billingford also got in touch about the Summer Chafer which Lalso mentioned. He recalled seeing tens of thousands of them in Norwich in the 70s, coming up out of the ground and flying around bumping into everything. He tells me that they used to call them "blind bees". A fascinating account and a stark reminder of how the numbers of insects have crashed over the last few decades.

Julia also brought something round for me to see, an insect that she did not recognise. I didn't recognise it immediately either, but after a closer look I was able to identify it as one of the bee-mimicking species of hoverfly, often known as Narcissus Bulb Fly (photo 1). Their larvae feed in bulbs but although they can sometimes be found on Narcissus (daffodils) they prefer bluebells. Several hoverfly species mimic bees, some more convincingly than others, but one of the best is the Bumblebee Plumehorn (photo 2) which is common around North Elmham.

I live near the village green and for the last few days I've been able to hear a







Whitethroat singing near the entrance. There's a small patch that's been kept unmown and it seems to have set up territory there. What a great illustration of how easily we can make things better for nature simply by doing less, not cutting everything back and "tidying" it all up too much. This little patch must be full of insect life for the Whitethroat to have deemed it a worthy place to set up home.

I haven't photographed this Whitethroat – in fact I haven't even seen it – behind neighbours' back gardens and close to a children's play area isn't a good place to hang around with binoculars and a longlens camera! But I can hear it singing while I'm in my study and when I walk through the green. I wonder if anyone else has noticed it?

Many of our warblers tend to sing from deep within bushes making it really hard to see them. But male Whitethroats often deliver their song from an exposed perch (photo 3). When they really want to show off they fly around in song (photos 4 and 5). Such song-flights are relatively unusual among our warblers, although Sedge Warbler is another species that can often be seen singing in flight.

As well as its white throat, Whitethroats have longer tails than many of the other warblers and they have distinctive rufous-brown edges to the wing feathers and the head is usually greyer in spring (photo 6). Young birds have browner heads (photo 7) but still have the obvious rufous in the wings.

Many of our warblers have pale throats but few have such a white throat clearly set off against an off-white breast and belly. The more elusive and very different-sounding Lesser Whitethroat shares the white throat but lacks the warm rufous-toned wings. The wings are brown, often contrasting with the grey head, but a less reddish brown than on Whitethroat. Because they're usually so skulking I don't have many good photos of Lesser Whitethroat taken in North Elmham, and the ones I do have I've used before in this column, so instead here's a photo of a unusually showy individual I saw at the coast a while back (photo 8). You can see the colder-brown wings, and also the smaller, purely grey bill. Although the legs are partly hidden you can just see that they are grey, not yellowy as on Whitethroat.

Whitethroats are vulnerable to falls in insect populations, both here on their breeding grounds and also in their sub-Saharan wintering grounds. Their numbers have fluctuated over the years – do you remember seeing more of them or fewer of them in years gone by? Or perhaps you haven't noticed them at all, in which case now is a good time to look and listen out for them. I don't know if the one on the green will still be there when you read this or not, but a good place to see them most years is at the bottom of the Cathedral Meadows, next to the railway at the bottom of the largest (northernmost) field.

As for Christmas cakes, they were eating them well into the new year.

This all happened in the late 40's and 50's and was told to me by mum, Doris.

We are so blessed to be surrounded by nature and increasingly conscious of the need to protect precious habitats. Do come along to be inspired by wildlife organisations, conservations groups and our local schools, as we give thanks for the rich ecology which we enjoy here in Norfolk.

The following day, 22nd June, Bishop Graham will join us for a celebratory service at St Mary's (10.30am). He is the lead spokesman for the Church of England on environmental issues, so we look forward to what he has to say!

Meanwhile, we celebrate Pentecost on 8th June (Acts chapter 2). Known in my childhood as 'Whit Sunday', we recall how the Holy Spirit filled Jesus' disciples with confidence and joy, so that they could go out and witness to Jesus as God's chosen Saviour. It was quite an event – over 3,000 people became Christians, and so the Church was 'born'.

Those first disciples became 'apostles' - literally sent out to teach and care for people following Jesus' example. In June, we remember Barnabas, the encourager; the birth of John the Baptist - Jesus' cousin who baptised Jesus and introduced him to others; and finally Peter and Paul. Paul we remember from his dramatic conversion to Christianity on the road to Emmaus and how he went on extraordinary missionary journeys, setting up church groups and teaching them about the Christian faith. Peter became known as the first "bishop" of Rome, even though he was executed under the brutal regime of the time.

St Peter, and his witness, has always inspired the Church. This year, on his feast day, 29th June, Michael Newey from North Elmham will be ordained Deacon, following in that long line of priestly ministers who have served the Church faithfully for 2,000 years. We give thanks for Michael and pray God's blessing on him as he prepares to serve the Church in the Dereham Team.



ldeas For Saving Water

The weather over the last few weeks has been glorious and it's been one of the driest and sunniest springs in about 60 years. Gardens need watering, paddling pools come out and hot tubs powered up.

But the lack of rain also means there is less water in the environment. The River Wensum runs beside the village and is one of the globally rare chalk streams which supports an unusual diversity of wildlife. Although its unlikely that there will be hose pipe bans this year, the less water we use the more is avail-able for the fish, insects, frogs and water voles that live in our rivers. Opposite are a few ways you can try and use less water and benefit the environment.

Many of us in the village will have smart water meters which measure how much water your household uses on a dayto-day basis. You can access the data through the Anglian Water App and maybe set yourself a challenge to see how low you can go.

Any other water saving tips? Share them on the NELS Facebook group.

Vitty Danino North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group Take showers rather than baths. Showers use much less water than baths – if you want an idea of how much just leave the plug in next time you use a shower that's above a bath. You can also collect the shower water and use it to water the garden.

Have a competition to see who in the house can take the shortest shower and still get clean (and you get the added benefit of a few more minutes in bed).

Make sure all your plumbing is working OK. A lot of people have 'leaky loos' where water keeps draining from the loo cistern into the pan which wastes a lot of water, as do dripping taps.

Use watering cans instead of hose pipes to water you garden (or don't water at all – everything that's alive in our garden is drought tolerant & it's one less chore so you can enjoy the sun!).

Put lids on pans when boiling water for cooking. The water boils more quickly and you use less of it.

Think about whether your clothes are dirty or if you can wear them again before washing. Washing clothes too frequently can be bad for them and put micro-plastics into the water courses.

Turn off the tap while you're brushing your teeth.
