NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 8 SEPTEMBER

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes, The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present: Mrs. J. Borgnis (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips, Mr. B. Gee, Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. P. Grainger, Mr. J. Labouchere, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. C. Smith.

Also in Attendance: Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor), Mr. K. Webb (Clerk), Mr. C. Hill (Elmham News) and Mr. C. Neill (NARS)

Apologies for Absence: Mrs. A. Keeble

Public Participation

A number of questions had been raised by a parishioner via an e-mail. Advice had also been received that a copy of the questions had been sent to the editors of Elmham News who have agreed to publish responses made. In line with normal procedures, responses to all questions and concerns raised by parishioners are given at meetings and recorded in the minutes and on the website. All issues have already been, or are being, addressed accordingly. Mr. Grainger proposed that this established practice be followed, and it was seconded by Miss Ferris. All members voted in favour.

Land Management Matters

Village Green: The hedges are due to be cut in the near future. The circus had another successful visit. A copy of the RoSPA report has been sent to NGF Play Ltd and their comments are awaited.

The police are continuing to visit the village on a regular basis.

Cathedral Ruins: The slopes have not yet been cut but Mrs. Keeble is chasing.

Cathedral Meadows: Derogation from Natural England regarding the disposal of the brash is awaited. It is the intention to reinstate the new footpath in the Spring.

Broom Green: The drainage work is to be done by the end of this month.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood): Some thinning work will be needed in Jubilee Wood in about two years.

Bridleway on disused railway line and other railway linked matters: Mr. Rayner reported a new path has been completed and is wide enough with a good level surface. A few weeds are appearing but the MNR will attend to this by strimming. Thanks were expressed to the Railway team for creating this option for residents.

A further objection has been made by the Parish Council to the miniature railway application and a decision is awaited. The matter may be considered by the District Council at their meeting in October.

Prince William Wood: Mr. Markwell had been able to reassure a resident that there were no plans for the new dog bin to be sited in her hedge or on her property. It is to be placed on the verge opposite.

Allotments: Some sheets have been discovered which appear to be asbestos. The annual rents are due to be collected on 11th October.

Street Lights: A suggestion regarding the possible provision of solar powered lights for the car park and footbridge areas of the Brookside development has been made.

Highway Matters

There have been no updates from Highways on existing issues which have previously been raised. A report is awaited on blocked and potential new drains. The street sweeper has visited the village and carried out the necessary action.

With regard to the Parish Partnership Scheme, Highways have recommended that a full assessment of the action taken this year is carried out before proceeding with

any new projects. Norfolk County Council is to inspect and consider the possibility of providing safety rails outside the Tea Post.

Pavilion and Playing Field

The barrier padlock has broken and is to be replaced. The moles have been dealt with. The Knit and Natter group are using the premises again on a regular basis.

Youth Club Facilities

Mr. Fitzalan Howard reported that Beetley Parish Council had held two consultations for their youth facilities – one door to door and the other on Facebook – with limited success.

It is important to consider special needs facilities. Quotations will be obtained for items such as a skate park and an outdoor gym.

Village Green Tree Planting Scheme

An application has been made to the Woodland Trust with planting between November 2021 and March, 2022. The Woodland Trust covers 70% of the cost.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022

The circus is due to be present for the week and will cost between £800 and £1,000.

Defibrillators

Arrangements had been made for a visit by Chris Neill, Chairman of NARS, who works full time as a paramedic with the East Anglia Air Ambulance service. Concern had been expressed for some time regarding the efficiency of the defibrillator system in North Elmham. Mr. Neill confirmed that, on average, one 999 call per week is received from the village. The effectiveness of the VETS system was queried, and Mr. Neill detailed the various ways forward. It was agreed that these would be fully discussed at the next meeting.

Village Green Board Displaying Names of Contributors to the Fund Raising

It had previously been suggested that the names of all parishioners involved in making financial contributions to assist with the purchase of the Village Green should have their names noted on a board which would be sited at an appropriate point on the green. Mr. Phillips had produced a list of 66 names some of whom are, unfortunately, no longer with us. The General Data Protection Regulations 2016, make the placing of such a board extremely difficult, if not impossible. It was agreed to consider the option of having two boards, one at each entry point to the green, stating that the purchase of the village green was made with contributions from members of the local community. Mr. Gee is to produce draft wording for discussion at the next meeting.

2011 Community Plan

Mr. Grainger had circulated an action points review document detailing all the original items covered by the Community Plan together with appropriate review comments in respect of action taken in the subsequent years to date. Mr. Grainger proposed that an up to date status should be provided for the various subject areas in the Plan with a dedicated page being provided on the website. This would be updated when required, thus providing information of progress made to parishioners. This proposal was seconded by Mr. Phillips. All in favour. Updates are to be submitted for consideration at the next meeting.

An issue had been raised by the Internal Auditor in the Annual Governance and Accountability Return for the year ended 31st March, 2021, in respect of the reclamation of VAT amounting to £1,682.00. The Parish Council received professional advice, on which VAT was payable, from Birkett Long LLP regarding the proposed Section 106 Agreement for a development by Orchard Homes (East Anglia) Ltd at Brookside Farm, North Elmham. The developers agreed to make payments to cover the net cost of this service with the Parish Council reclaiming the VAT element. This action

COUNTY SCHOOL STATION

Readers may remember that in the March and April issues of Elmham News I alerted people to the fact that the Mid Norfolk Railway Company was allowing the construction of a Miniature Railway at County School Station without first obtaining planning permission for the scheme.

It is good to see that a retrospective planning application has now been submitted and that the Parish Council, having considered the details of the application, has submitted two letters of objection. It is mainly objecting on the grounds that the miniature railway is being constructed outside the area of permitted development under the terms of a transfer deed the company signed with Breckland Council in March 2003. It is also objecting on the grounds that the Railway Company is still claiming the railway footpath as a "Permissive Path", which it certainly is not. If readers haven't seen the even more provocative signs erected by the company claiming the path to be a permissive path they should go and have a look.

Surely there are also wider issue here. If the miniature railway goes ahead, it will inevitably become a very successful tourist attraction. Then, the company will have to construct a range of public facilities as well as a large car park, which will significantly change the character of the station and this part of the Wensum Valley. It such a pity that the railway company seems unable to engage properly with our community in discussions on what their long-term plans might be. It is a nice letter from Charles Robinson in the last Elmham News, but it tells us little about what they are planning to do at County School.

This scheme will certainly work against Breckland's original purpose of designating this totally unspoilt part of the Wensum Valley as a Conservation Area, creating a low-key heritage centre in the station and providing a footpath along the railway line so that it can be a place for quiet countryside enjoyment. It would surely be better to call a halt to the construction of this miniature railway now.

DOES YOUR FAMILY HAVE A FAVOURITE RECIPE?

When my children were little this recipe was their favourite. Sadly, I lost it years ago but have just found it screwed up in a very old recipe book. Easy-peasy to make so give it a go!

Date Crumble Squares

7oz self raising flour 6oz butter 6oz caster sugar 4oz rolled oats

For the filling
6oz chopped dates
4 tblsps cold water
1oz caster sugar
1 tsp vanilla essence

Brush the oblong tin with melted fat.

First make the filling. Put the chopped dates into the pan with the water and 1 oz of caster sugar, then over a low heat stir them together until they are thick and well combined.

Mix in the vanilla essence and leave the filling on one side to cool.

Sift the flour into a mixing bowl, add the butter cut into small pieces and, using the fingertips only, rub the fat into the flour so that it is evenly distributed. Stir in the sugar

and oats, then turn half the mixture into the tin and press it evenly into the base.

Spread the cooled date filling on top, then sprinkle over the remaining oat mixture.

Bake the tray bake on the centre shelf of a moderate oven, gas mark 4 or 350 F/180C for about 45 minutes until the mixture is a light golden brown colour.

Cut the Date Crumble Squares into 15 pieces while they are still hot, then leave them to cool slightly in the tin. Lift out the pieces onto a wire tray to cool completely.

Can be frozen.

PS Next time I make them I am going to increase the amount of dates in the mixture... only because we are greedy! Delicious with a cup of tea.



Elmham Hears About Its Future EDP July 1974

North Elmham should be designated a conservation area within the next few weeks, members of the parish council and conservation committee were told by Mr. T.N. Povey Breckland District Council's Assistant Planning Officer, at a special meeting at Elmham School on Monday night.

Mr Povey said that the draft conservation orders for Elmham and Mattishall – the first villages to be considered by Breckland for conservation – should be completed during October; and the following month both villages should be officially designated.

Explaining what conservation would mean to Elmham, Mr Povey said it did not imply preserving the past untouched, but rather adapting the past to meet the needs of the present, at the same time enhancing the character of the village.

Elmham had a simple character, with mainly red brick and pantiled housing, and was an area of great archaeological significance. He said that after designation he would like to see more buildings listed as being of historical interest – including the long flint wall round Elmham Park.

Among other things, conservation would mean that the public would be given 21 days' notice of a proposed planning application: there would be tree preservation orders: it would be virtually impossible to demolish buildings: and more power would be given to the village to negotiate with the Highway Authority.

It could also mean stricter control over the replacement of windows, and the building of porches and garages.

It will put a great onus on people to preserve the character of their houses, he said.

On the proposed building of nine houses, by Unigate Development Ltd, in Eastgate street – a plan opposed by the Parish

Council but passed by Breckland- Mr Povey said the scheme was not as bad as it might have been but he agreed it was not up to the standards he would hope to encourage.

He volunteered to take up the Parish Council's case with Unigate, to see if the planned development could be modified to be more in line with the needs of a conservation area. Mr Povey agreed with Dr Peter Wade- Martins that a brick or flint wall would help the open frontage to blend in better with the character of the village.

Mr Povey said Elmham was listed as a Category two village – for controlled rather than mushroom groups. County Councillor Mr Anthony Don said he believed the village had grown enough, and any more large development would risk creating two separate communities – the newcomers and the old residents.

It was agreed that both The Pound and Elmham Park should be included in the conservation area.

A Letter From A Resident

I was saddened to read of the delays to the proposed footpath/bridlepath along the old railway line between North Elmham and Great Ryburgh.

British Rail appear to be disregarding the importance of the purchase of the complete line for the project. The route as it stands runs through some beautiful scenery and offers sound footings to walk on.

The landowners' objections that the centre section passes near a sensitive area are feeble, the wildlife have had to get used to the noise and disturbance of gravel excavations at Sennowe Park and the sound of gunfire during the shooting season. A few ramblers enjoying a walk will probably go unnoticed.

Bang! But Bridge Not Blown Up EDP 1956

A total of 2lb of gelignite was packed into nine drill holes in an old humpback bridge at Billingford yesterday. But when the explosion came there was only an 18 inch deep hole in the road surface with a few pieces of tarmac dislodged. A more powerful charge is to be used today in order to blow the bridge up.

The bridge has not been used for about five years since a diversion was made across to a new bridge 50 yards away. Formerly it carried the coach road from Lynn to Norwich across the river Wensum. But it proved too narrow for modern traffic, and it was by-passed in 1951.

Since then, pieces of masonry have fallen into the river and it has become a danger to the local children who play in the water and fish from the bridge.

Captain Hugh James, of North Elmham is in charge of the operation. Now he has seen the result of the test charge. he is confident that he can demolish the bridge today. (and he did! Captain James lived at 'The Shettles', JW).

In the Elmham archives we have various photographs of many of the village children all playing in the water and older boys diving off the top of the bridge having taught themselves how to swim in the river and later were perfecting their diving skills.

Happy days from long ago.

OLD NAMES, NEW NAMES

Having lived here all my life and everyone using the same name for a place or field in the village, it is strange to think that once there were different names for places in the locality. It's like giving your house a name, then moving out, and the new owners giving the property a new name... soon the old one will be forgotten.

Glancing through Andrew Macnair's dissertation on Foulsham and North Elmham my eye was caught by the field name for the Playing Field.

Looking at a map for 1830 (diagram 1) what we know now as the Playing Field was called Savages Close and it stretched from the end of the Elmham Park wall on the Brisley road across to the roadside near the bungalows next to the Playing Field. There was a thatched house where the first bungalow is today. It was demolished in the 1950's, and that's where James Savage lived. There was a diagonal path across the field called Savage's Path. I am only guessing, not having researched James Savage, that he worked at the brickworks on the left hand

side of the road towards Brisley near the wood and he regularly crossed the field to get to the Brisley road.

When I was a child that field was always called the Green Field ,now we know it as the Playing Field.


At the time of the Enclosure Acts many roads ,tracks ,footpaths and bridleways were closed and ceased to exist. There were interesting names like Holly Bush Road, Old Hall Lane, Dobb's Gap, Sallow Lane, Peter's Path. Obviously, many of these were named after people who regularly made use of these paths.


On another map I found the name Savory's Path (diagram 2), the same one previously called Savages Path, a corruption perhaps of James Savage. Who knows?

WIVES PLUS ALL CLUB

On Thursday 2nd September, the Wives Plus All Club visited Elmham House here in North Elmham, the home of Tom and Jo Fitzalan Howard. Tom (photo 1) kindly gave us a tour of the outside areas and outbuildings of the Estate along with a very interesting history of the lost Elmham Hall and how the house we know today came into existence.

Published information is that in the reign of Richard II, Hugh de Spenser Bishop of Norwich built a fortified Manor House on the site of th old Cathedral, with a deer park in the rest of the present registered boundary. The Manor passed to the Cokes of Holkham who split the Manor up. In 1720 Richard Warner a prominent Norwich lawyer having acquired the Elmham Estate for £15,000 from the Cokes built a new house on a virgin site on an eminence overlooking the Town Beck. The house was approached by a newly built long straight drive from the north east. A small Deer Park may have been created when the house was first built in an area to the west of Elmham Park and is thought to have survived until at least 1794. Tom showed us the Lake almost certainly created by Richard Warner which was formed by damming Town Beck.

In 1765 the Estate passed to Warner's Grandson Richard Milles who remodelled and enlarged the Park, beyond the water, updated the Gardens and built the Walled Kitchen Garden which we walked round. Richard Milles also constructed the fine Ice House, which we went inside, (photo pg 31) to the south west of the kitchen garden which has a surviving 8 m deep pit inside, now restored. Protected feral bats have now taken residence in it. In 1820 the Estate was inherited by Milles' grandson George John Watson who changed his name to Milles and later inherited the title Fourth Baron Sondes. He commissioned William Donthorn in 1829 to remodel the Hall and made great changes to the park extending it to the East, also a new East Entrance Drive and Lodge and built the Eastern Park Wall. We visited the Venison Larder he built in 1840.

at a time when there were many changes to the Estate to show off his status and wealth. With recent renovations this Larder has been made into a tiny Chapel and is visited by walkers and visitors to the village. Also in 1840 he built the Dovecote, still used today by feral doves, (photo inset pg 30). The Elmham Estate increased in size from 4,712 acres in 1850 to 4.939 in 1897. The Estate remained in the Sondes family until 1924, although there were attempts to sell it, the first being unsuccessful in 1898. The Hall was used by the army from 1914 to 1918. Having fallen into decline In 1919 the sale particulars described the Hall:

GROUND FLOOR a large entrance hall, smoking room, morning room. inner hall, dining room, library, drawing room and study.

FIRST FLOOR 9 principal bedrooms and 3 dressing rooms, 1 bathroom and 2 WCs.

SECOND FLOOR 8 further bedrooms and dressing rooms over domestic offices, 5 servants' bedrooms and 6 attics.

THE DOMESTIC OFFICES butler's bedroom, housemaid's pantry and sitting room, kitchen, 2 larders, scullery, dairy, bake house, housekeeper's room and 2 large store rooms.

BASEMENT the butler's pantry, servant's hall and cellars.

The House was purchased in 1924 by a developer who demolished it and sold all the mature timber in the park. In 1926 the Estate was purchased by Mrs Emily Birbeck who built a new house besides the old outbuildings which had survived the demolition. She laid out a small garden to the south east of the new house Elmham House, on the site of the old Hall.

In 1987 the Estate passed to her grandson Robin Don who developed a vineyard on part of the park. The site of approx. 600 acres remains in his family's ownership today.

Elmham House garden and other land is registered under the Historic Buildings and Ancient Monument Act 1953 within the register of Historic Parks and Gardens by Historic England for its special historic interest and the original Elmham Hall and Estate are part of "Lost Heritage" - Memorial to England's Lost Country Homes.

After a very interesting tour we were refreshed by tea, coffee and cake in the outbuilding by Tom and his wife Jo. Thanks to you both for a lovely historical informative evening about an interesting House and Estate sitting within our village.



NORTH ELMHAM WILDLIFE

It's been over three years since I started doing the wildlife survey of the Cathedral Meadows and in that time I've identified over 1,800 species there including 119 birds, over 1,200 insects and over 250 plants. There's still much more to be discovered and I intend to keep visiting and adding to the list, but I'd also like to start paying a bit more attention to some of the other sites around the village. I've been surveying the churchyards this summer and spending a bit more time along the railway line, and there's plenty more besides, not least in my own little garden where I've had some very interesting discoveries over the years. So it's time for a change, and instead of focusing this column more-or-less exclusively on the Cathedral Meadows, I'm going to tell you about the wildlife I encounter anywhere in the parish.

This month the moths in my garden are a good place to start, as there have been some really good ones over the last few weeks. Until recently, Dewick's Plusia only appeared in the UK as a rare migrant visitor but in the last few years they have started breeding here and are turning up in moth traps increasingly often. I was excited to find my first, a fine individual (photo 1), sitting on the top of my moth trap when I went out to have a look one night. You can't tell from my photo but the white spot in the middle of the wing is reflective and glistened in the light of my headtorch.

As good as that was, it was trumped the following night by another exciting moth that has a similar story. Huge, distinctive and extremely rare, the Clifden Nonpareil had long been considered a dream moth, an almost mythical beast that moth-trappers like me joked about finding knowing that the odds of actually doing so were ridiculously small. But in the last few years they have turned up in a few southern counties with such regularity that they must have started to colonise

and, in 2019, a handful of records here in Norfolk suggested that they might be doing so here too. More records followed last year adding more weight to that theory. But a few days into their flight period this year I hadn't heard of any records around the county, so was this just a temporary colonisation? Would they revert to be a mega-rare migrant? Had I missed the opportunity to see one of these glorious creatures? Or was it just that they, like many other species this year, were a bit late getting started? Well I got my answer the morning after the Dewick's Plusia when I went down to the moth trap at first light like I do every day and there in the trap looking up at me was a huge moth, its patterned grey forewings held slightly apart so that I could clearly see the diagnostic blue and black hindwings (photo 2, showing the tips of my fingers to give a sense of scale). From underneath it looked even more remarkable with bold black and white stripes and just a hint of the blue colour showing through (photo 3). A dream come true! And yes, mine was among the first this year but over the next couple of weeks guite a few have been reported around the county - this fantastic moth is now a species that seems to be becoming established in Norfolk.


Moths like the Clifden Nonpareil, the commoner Red Underwing (similar but with the blue replaced by red) and another new colonist which I haven't seen yet, the Dark Crimson Underwing, are sometimes more readily attracted to sugar and/or rotting fruit than they are to light, so I've been leaving a plate of rotting fruit covered in a solution of sugar and treacle in the garden. This may have been what tempted the Clifden Nonpareil to the garden although it ended up in the moth trap. I've had no luck with the other moths but in the daytime the mixture has been very popular with Red Admiral butterflies (photo 4) – I counted 28 on or around the plate one day. The fallen apples in the orchard at the County





School Station are also attracting good numbers of Red Admirals.

There's another new moth in the county that is a recent colonist but which isn't so popular, though it is attractive. Britain's first Box-tree Moth was found in Kent in 2007 but had been expected here, having already become established in many European countries after being accidentally imported from Asia with Box trees. The vast majority of moths in this country are benign, but this non-native species is considered a pest as it's extremely successful where there are Box trees and its caterpillars quickly munch their way through the leaves, sometimes stripping them bare. It arrived in Norfolk in 2013, and it was probably no coincidence that the first two records were close to a garden centre in Costessey. Within the next couple of years it quickly became a nuisance to Box tree growers in Norwich but it wasn't until the last year or so that the species started to become widespread

in Norfolk. I caught my first two here in the second half of August (photo 5).

Another insect that has been introduced from Asia along with its host plant is the Rhododendron Leafhopper. As I walked along Heath Lane I checked the Rhododendrons growing along the edge of the wood and quite easily found well over a hundred of these little leafhoppers (actually, at nearly a centimetre long they're quite big for leafhoppers). With their red stripes on a green background they're quite attractive insects (photo 6).

There are several species of Tortoise Beetle in the UK but until this month I'd never found one. They are unusual among beetles in being quite flattened and round in shape with their heads completely hidden from above. My first was along the railway line, a bright apple-green species called Cassida viridis (photo 7).

Many of our native insects are declining rapidly but I've already mentioned a few new arrivals that are increasing. Another of those is the Willow Emerald Damselfly. Closely related to the Scarce Emerald Damselfly I mentioned last month, the Willow Emerald Damselfly has been present in the UK for just the last 12 years. My first local sighting was one hanging on our Wisteria. It was a little too high up to see the diagnostic spur marking on the side of the body so I caught it in a net for a closer look – which had the added bonus of allowing me to photograph it close up (photo 8).

Several people have been in touch with me over the last month to let me know about their sightings around the village including two different people who reported seeing a Peregrine at the north end of the village and a lady in Station Road who kindly showed me one of two Elephant Hawkmoth caterpillars on her fuchsias (photo 9). 

ST MARY'S CHURCH

I wonder if any of you have taken the "kindness test?" This is a questionnaire devised by psychologists at the University of Sussex, coordinated by the B.B.C. to explore people's attitudes to kindness. To me kindness, along with compassion, is a fundamental part of being a human although it can be seen as weakness. I am firmly of the opinion that at times it is the most courageous thing we can do.

The New Testament especially the Gospels gives numerous examples of kindness. For example, Jesus' parables of the Prodigal Son and the Good Samaritan. In one the recipient of the kind act is a close relative, the other a complete stranger. Then there is the story of the group of friends who bring a paralysed man on a stretcher to be healed by Jesus.

It has been so heartening during the pandemic to see acts of kindness both large and small being carried out. The way that communities have come together to help out those less fortunate than themselves has also been a step change in many people's attitudes.

As Aesop in one of his fables said "No act of kindness, however small, is wasted. In the fable of the Lion and the Mouse he shows us that it's hard to always be kind. Sometimes you just don't feel like it but it's better to do so because some day

we may need someone to show us some kindness one day.

I leave you with the words of a Glen Campbell song from 1970.
