NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 2ND AUGUST

The following information is taken from the Draft PC minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Public Participation

a) A letter had been sent to Elmham News regarding the possibility of launching a Community Car Scheme. It was mentioned that there had been such a scheme in the village some years ago. There is an ageing population and there are people in the parish with disabilities. The cost of a taxi to Dereham, one way, is in the region of £20. It is very difficult for some older people to get to hospital. It was asked if the Parish Council would look at the possibility of having a feasibility study. Grants are apparently available for this particular activity. It was felt that, in the long term, the success of a project of this kind would be totally dependent on the number of volunteers it would be able to attract. In general, the proposal was welcomed, and the matter will be placed on the agenda for discussion at the next Parish Council meeting.

b) It was acknowledged that the Community Speedwatch team is doing a great job. A commentwas made that they are often seen at the bottom end of the village (the south) but not in the top part, (the north), in the Pump Street area. The scheme launched in June and there are four locations, including in the top part, for the approved activities. A decision was made to concentrate on the recognised hot-spots, e.g. the King's Head junction. More volunteers are needed and it was stressed that, if additional people would be prepared to come forward to join the existing team, more locations could be covered, including the area at Pump Street. c) A suggestion had been made to set up a climate positive group in the village. The goal would be to engage the community in activities that make a positive impact on the planet and the people in the village, such as repair workshops, rewilding, litter collection and food sharing.

It was mentioned that some litter picking has been done in the past and it may be useful to liaise with that group. It was felt that there were rooms in buildings in the village that could support a group of this type. A number of volunteers would be needed and it was felt that the proposed group could be mentioned in Elmham News.

d) The Walking Football team was started about two years ago and has recently separated from North Elmham Football Club. The team members are not satisfied with the condition of the area of the pitch they use and state that improvements need to be made for safety reasons. They have recently been using the facilities at Northgate High School, in Dereham. For further details on this matter, please refer to later item. There currently are 22 members.

Letters have been received from parishioners regarding two ash trees - see correspondence, It is agreed that the trees need attention. A survey is to be done and quotations are to be obtained by Mr. Phillips. Initially, eight trees are involved and early indications are that the cost is going to be in the region of £3,830. Proposed by Mr. Fitzalan Howard and seconded by Mr. Rayner. All in favour.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood): A sapling is to be trimmed down by Mr. Duffield.

Bridleway On Disused Railway Line And Other Railway Linked Matters: A

parishioner had reported suspected weed killing by spraying on the railway line and is very concerned about the impact on wild flowers, bees, butterflies and pet dogs being walked. The matter has been forwarded to Mr. Robinson of the Mid Norfolk Railway but a response has not yet been received.

Church Meadow: Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that there is to be a meeting regarding a possible trench on 10th August.

Allotments

Mr. Phillips reported that an allotment had become free and there are still people on the waiting list.

Street Lights

Mr. Markwell advised that two quotations had been received and Mr. Phillips proposed that the submission from Jones Electrical of £367.50 + VAT be accepted, seconded by Mrs. Keeble. All in favour

Pavilion and Playing Field

Details are to follow regarding the North Elmham Junior Football event. There are to be two sessions in the pavilion for the training of referees.

The Walking Football team wishes to apply for a grant under the Football Foundation Scheme. They say that they are eligible for £1,920 per annum for the first two years, followed by a tapered

amount in the subsequent six years. The application has to be in the name of the land owner, i.e. North Elmham Parish Council, and the officers of the Walking Football Team have been authorised to complete the documentation, with it being approved and signed off by the Parish Council. The funds are needed to improve the quality of the playing service. Proposed by Mr. Phillips and seconded by Mrs. Keeble. All in favour.

Eastgate Centre

A window has been broken. Decorating has been completed.

Request For Funding From North Elmham Pcc

An expression of thanks has been received

Breckland Council's Deployable Surveillance Cameras & Display Signage

A response had been received from Lisa Turner, Environmental Enforcement Assistant, Breckland Council regarding the procurement of new mobile deployable surveillance cameras, which are to be situated in towns and parishes with high levels of anti-social behaviour and fly tipping, for trialling.

Only one camera has been obtained to date and further information will be given near the beginning of September.

Pavilion Electricity Plan Renewal

The current electricity plan for the Pavilion comes to an end on 21st August, 2023. The current expenditure is in the region of £1,030 and we are offered a one year fixed deal of £1,523.32 or a two years fixed agreement which is slightly cheaper at £1,501.10. It was agreed to proceed with a contract for two years. Proposed by Mr. Smith and seconded by Mr. Labouchere. All in favour.

BRECKLAND LOCAL PLAN UPDATE

After a quiet period over the summer, a new consultation has been opened for Breckland's Local Plan, with a deadline for submissions currently given as early November. This is a continuation of the previous Issues & Options Consultation to which I'm sure many of you made comments. Although there is no specific mention of a New Town in this new phase, you may wish to make comments about the idea of one, along with comments about where, in general terms, development should be placed across Breckland in the period up to 2046, as well as about the other topics included in this consultation.

This consultation is not asking questions about specific sites which were put forward in the 'call for sites' phase – it is expected that this will happen once Breckland has assessed all of the sites and decided which of those are not practicable for various reasons. The remainder will be termed the 'preferred options', which are likely to cater for more houses than will be needed, so these will need to be reduced. The resulting consultation, at some point in 2024, will be the time when residents will be able to comment on the remaining possible sites for housing, in the preferred options consultation. We very much hope that the proposed New Town will not appear as a preferred site, but if it does it will be at that point that a concerted effort will be made to submit comments covering all aspects of why the proposal is the wrong one for the proposed site.

At an introductory preview event for Parish Councils, residents were encouraged to participate to give their views. It was stressed that previous comments will still be valid, suggesting there is no need to repeat what you may have said before. However, there is no reason why you shouldn't put in further comments at this stage.

There are various ways to submit your comments: online via Breckland's Commonplace website at https:// brecklandlocalplan.commonplace.is, or by email to planning.policyteam@breckland. gov.uk or by post to Planning Policy Team, Elizabeth House, Walpole Loke, Dereham, NR19 1EE, Further details of the consultation are available online at the commonplace website, or at various dropin events. The most local of the latter is to be held in Dereham Market Place between 10.00am and 1.00pm on Tuesday, 17th October, where you will also be able to give your opinions. I and/or CANT will provide further updates as the Local Plan review progresses, particularly when it becomes possible to submit comments on individual sites.

TRANSFORMATION OF B1145 BRIDGE


Until the early 1950's, if you wanted to go to Billingford and on to Norwich you would have gone over a small hump backed bridge, not on the present road as it is today on the B1145, but very near the cottage on the on the right, if you were coming from Elmham. The hump backed bridge was further along the river Wensum towards Swanton Morley. The layout of the road was quite different then, it meandered a bit!

I imagine this small bridge had stood there for hundreds of years, but was now unsafe so the county council said. The river was deep under the bridge and this part of the river was used by us village children as a swimming pool! Daring older boys would stand on the wall of the bridge and dive into the water. That was how they all learned to dive. Youngsters weren't molly coddled in those days!

A new bridge was to be built and a straighter road would be replacing the centuries old road .But the hump backed bridge had to go. So it was decided the best way to get rid of it would be to blow it up!! Everyone was saddened to think about that little old bridge being flattened. It put up a fight and took two goes with gelignite before it landed in the water. Bang went our swimming pool!

The road was to be realigned, straightened out not with a wiggle as before and a spanking new bridge built, strong enough for much bigger lorries. This was in the early 1950's. This new bridge was the first to be built of prestressed concrete- now used for most bridges, and the first to be built by council workmen instead of civil engineers.

This bridge had a shelf life of 42 years before it was deemed unsafe .Contractors May Gurney in 1991 were working having to de-stress it by dismantling it piece by piece. They were working from the original plans, drawn up in 1949 to take it apart before building another new bridge of the same design.

Sadly, the plans did not show the exact route of all of the 18 miles of thick wire which pull the bridge together. The call went out for help and a foreman who was involved in the building of this pioneering modern-style bridge more than 40 years before came forward. Mr Bert Pestell who was now 91 visited the bridge over the Wensum on the B1145 and was able to give advice. The site agent said "He is the original foreman, it's amazing. He was able to tell us a few things about the bridge".

The road was closed to traffic for 16 weeks whilst a new bridge was being built. The surrounding villages were up in arms as more traffic would be trying to get through them, especially large lorries many of them coming to the bridge.

It was not a happy time for Elmham!

Wonder how long this present bridge will survive, it is now over 30 years old.

DID YOU KNOW?

There are many interesting facts about our village that many folk are unaware of! Having lived here for 45 years, I was surprised to find out that during World War I, there was a Royal Flying Corp military landing ground here, (although our village historian Janet Woodhouse did know!)

The RFC 51 (Home Defence) Squadron was formed at Mousehold Heath aerodrome in Norwich in 1916 and then moved to Thetford in June 1916 operating B.E.2, B.E.12 and Avro 504 aircraft to defend Norfolk from air attack. (Interestingly, B.E. stands for Bleriot Experimental). For a short period in 1917, the Squadron operated from a Military Landing Ground in North Elmham although records don't show if that was the complete Squadron or a Detachment. Intriguingly however, exactly whereabouts the landing strip was located seems to be difficult to pinpoint!

It would be interesting to hear if anyone can add to the story, particularly where the Landing Ground was situated. You will find Janet's and my email addresses in the Elmham News!

CAMPAIGN AGAINST NEW TOWN (CANT)

We are extremely grateful to the writer of this piece, John Hoskins who is keeping us all informed about the necessity of not letting our politicians just paying lip service the group.

The summer holidays for political types is over and it's time to re-awaken everyone's awareness of the absurd possibility of a new town being built on the sleepy farmland between Bintree, Billingford and North Elmham.

We (the CANT group) met Jerome Mayhew MP in July, who promised to state publicly his antipathy to the plan. He hasn't, and we will chase him down.

Councillors Bill Borrett and Gordon Bambridge promised us a clear timeline of the next steps following the Issues and Options Consultation. It has not appeared, and we will chase them down.

Breckland Council have suddenly announced that they are holding two meetings in September for Parish Councils at which they will 'preview' the community consultation on the Local Plan. Who knows why they need to do this when they have already done the Issues and Options Consultation? Key members of the CANT team will be at the meetings to find out what (on earth) is going on.

After giving us encouragement in July by emphasizing the need to concentrate on brownfield first, Rishi Sunak has now shot himself in the foot with the announcement that polluting rivers is fine as we need to get on with building

houses. OK, that's not what he meant, but that's how it came over. Michael Gove then claimed that overall river pollution would in fact be decreased, because they had a plan to ensure both water companies and farmers drastically reduced nutrient run-off. However, if that was really the case, why did he not announce that first, explaining exactly how it was going to work, before allowing the re-start of housebuilding under new, strict, clear regulations?

In truth, it was inevitable that the politicians would break the stranglehold on building caused by the nutrient neutrality issue. And although we may all strongly dislike the announcement, it may not be a critical factor in our campaign. Any new proposal for 5,000 houses is obviously going to claim that it will have the best water-treatment plant on the planet, together with several off-set strategies that would fit whatever the regulations might be at the time. Yes, the Wensum is the most sensitive of rivers, but the developers know this and obviously believe they can work around it.

As you all know, the powerful arguments against the proposed new town include lack of demand, lack of access, lack of employment and lack of infrastructure. These are backed up by environmental issues that include not only impact on the Wensum but also on the aguifer beneath the site; together with a huge (unnecessary) increase in local traffic because of the deeply rural situation and a loss of prime farming land. Anyone reading this will be able to add many more detailed points, all of which we will gather together, if and when the argument has to be made against a specific proposal.

Next Steps

After the Council's meetings we will update you with what (we think) their intentions are. At the same time, we will let you know further news from the MPs and our local

BEEKEEPING CHALLENGES

Beekeepers are now taking off the last of the summer honey, or as I like to call it, amber nectar, and will start applying insecticides. We do not apply chemicals until the last of the honey is removed as this would tarnish the raw honey.

The chemicals are needed to control a blood sucking mite called varroa. I would like to explain some of the life cycle of this particular mite. Not only does it suck the blood of the mature bees, it also carries viruses which cause the bees to have deformed wings which means the bees cannot fly and therefore fall out of the hive and die. The queen bee lays her egg in a cell and the varroa mite lays six to seven eggs in the same cell before that cell is sealed with a wax capping. The Varroa mites hatch and mate within the cell and attach themselves to the bee larva. On emerging from the cell some of the mites disperse and attach themselves to other, un-infected bees and so the infestation in the hive spreads. This leads to a heavy infestation very quickly. This

will eventually destroy the complete bee colony. The newly hatched mites are already fertilised ready to carry on their life cycle.

We then feed the bees to see them through the winter.

There is another threat for the bees. The ASIAN HORNET. It has been sweeping up through France for the last ten years and is out of control there with hundreds of nests being reported. This hornet has now arrived in southern England and it is gradually creeping up the country. Unlike our European hornet, these hornets are capable of killing a complete hive in a matter of a few days. If anyone finds a nest it is vital that it is reported to the local bee keeping association as soon as possible. The Asian hornet builds its nest high up in trees. These are football size nests and very difficult to locate. Specialist suits are worn to deal with the nests as a normal bee suit does not give enough protection. So, the bees and the beekeepers have yet another challenge in the years ahead.





ELMHAM WILDLIFE

There are at least nine different species of hawk-moth which you could see in North Elmham – perhaps more if you're very lucky. Hawk-moths are placid, friendly moths – if you find one resting you will most likely be able to encourage it to sit on your finger, allowing you to take a good close look at it. They are big, striking moths that have the power to lure people into a life-long fascination with moths.

Take James Lowen for example, a Norwich-based nature-writer and photographer. In his recent book "Much Ado About Mothing" (which I recommend) he recounts an encounter with a Poplar Hawk-moth. Previously indifferent about moths, this experience of being shown a Poplar Hawk-moth ("huge and glorious and utterly wrong") changed his life. He was hooked, and moths are now an important part of his life.

Poplar Hawk-moths (photo 1) are lovely velvety grey moths. The wings have scalloped edges and their veins are marked by pale lines. They are unique in the way that in normal resting position their hindwing protrudes forwards in front of their forewing. If disturbed or alarmed, they open their wings wide revealing a flash of red at the base of the hindwings, presumably serving the purpose of scaring predators.

They're one of our commoner hawkmoths. I catch quite a few every year and if you're lucky you could even find one without a moth trap. A neighbour found one recently and brought it round to show me. I don't know if it had quite the same effect on her as it did James, but I think she at least appreciated its beauty, and I appreciated her sharing it with me.

Another friend always insisted that he would never be interested in moths. After much badgering, he eventually joined me for some moth-trapping at a site not far from North Elmham. He insisted that it would be the first and last time he came

'mothing' – unless perhaps if I was able to show him a hawk-moth. By midnight I had failed to do so and he decided he had had enough. "I'll give it five more minutes" he said. Just in the nick of time, not one but two Elephant Hawk-moths arrived (photo 2). He was in awe! Within a week he had bought himself a mothtrap and over the last ten years there's barely been a night when he hasn't been looking for moths. This year he's managed to see well over 1,000 different species of moth around the county in just a few months.

From above, Elephant Hawk-moths are a mix of olive-yellow and pink but from underneath they're shocking pink. It's not the adult moth that gives them their name, but the caterpillars which are supposed to resemble elephants' trunks. Most years they are the commonest hawk-moth in my garden.

Much scarcer is the closely-related Small Elephant Hawk-moth. As the name suggests, it's rather similar to the Elephant Hawk-moth, but smaller (photo 3). I don't catch them in North Elmham every year but in a good year I can get several.

Another hawk-moth I catch regularly in North Elmham is the Eyed Hawk-moth. It's another big one and when it's at rest if looks velvety and lovely but when it spreads its wings it flashes a brightly colourful pair of "eyes" – no doubt to scare predators away (photo 4).

A hawk-moth I've seen more of in recent years than I used to here is Pine Hawk-moth. I suppose they're not as colourful as some but they're certainly impressive (photo 5). Their caterpillars feed on pines and spruce so if you go to somewhere like Bintree Wood you can find them more easily.

The biggest of our resident hawk-moths is the Privet Hawk-moth. It's having a run of bad years. This year was especially bad and I only caught one – some years I've caught well over ten. Lots of moth

species cycle through good and bad years so hopefully numbers will improve again over the coming years. There's nothing gentle about Privet Hawk-moths, at least in their appearance. They look sinister, big, pointed moths that will fill your hand, a black 'cap' and dark top set against paler grey lower wings. When they open their wings they reveal a thickset body covered in rows of black and candy pink bands and their hindwings reflect this pattern (photo 6).

Lime Hawk-moth is a species that I don't see very often. I've only ever caught one at home and one at the Cathedral Meadows (photo 7). Elsewhere I've seen a few and I suspect if my garden was closer to some lime trees I would catch plenty. I bet they're in the lime trees that line the road up to County School for example, but apparently they can also feed on birch, elm or alder.

These seven species are the only resident hawk-moths that I've seen in North Elmham, but there's another that I wouldn't be very surprised to find. The Broad-bordered Bee Hawk-moth is scarce but fairly widespread and may well be round here in small numbers. Let me know if you've seen one! They're much smaller than most hawk-moths and are seen during the daytime, often hovering at flowers like Red Campion. They have clear wings (except for the broad dark border that contributes to its name) and short furry bodies like a bee. The nearest I've seen them is near Holt (photo 8) but they have been recorded much closer than that and I wouldn't be surprised if they sometimes appear, for example along the railway where there is plenty of Red Campion to feed on.

Another hawk-moth you're most likely to see hovering at flowers during the daytime is Hummingbird Hawk-moth. This is a migrant species which comes to the UK in varying numbers each year. I've rarely seen them in North Elmham





so my photo (photo 9) is from elsewhere, but probably if I was better at growing suitable flowers in my garden I would see them more often. I suspect those of you who are better gardeners than me might see this moth more often than I do.

Another migrant hawk-moth that only visits us from overseas is the Convolvulus Hawk-moth, a huge moth – bigger even than our Privet Hawk-moth. I've only ever caught one in North Elmham (photo 10), but some moth-trappers up their odds of catching one by growing Tobacco Plant (Nicotiana). Convolvulus Hawk-moths have such a long proboscis they are able to reach the nectar in the long tubular flower heads of the Tobacco Plant. If you grow Nicotiana then pop out with a torch shortly after dark when they're in flower and if you're lucky you might see this huge moth buzzing around your flowers.

One day I hope to share with you news of another rare migrant hawk-moth, perhaps a Striped Hawk-moth or even a Death's-

head Hawk-moth. The latter, with a wing-span that can exceed 12 cm, would be a dream find! If you've ever seen "Silence of the Lambs" then you'll have an idea what they look like. Friends who have seen them tell me that they make a squeaking noise, something that I've never heard from any other moth. Someone I know caught one in Great Ryburgh last year so I live in hope of finding one in my moth trap here in North Elmham.

Thanks again to those of you who have been in touch with your sightings. There's always lots to see around the parish or in your gardens if you take the time to walk slowly and stop frequently to look and listen. Evident in rank and bridging the classes, and essential pillar, champion to the masses.


Sightings became fewer as the years rolled past, now hard to recall when seeing him last.


