NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 9 JULY

The following information is taken from the Draft Minutes and may be expanded where the Editors feel more explanation is necessary. The full official minutes can be viewed in the Post Office and on the Community website, once approved.

Councillors Present Were: Mr. P. Grainger (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips (Vice Chairman), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. B. Gee, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. N. Markwell, Mr. M. Rayner and Mr. J. Sowinski, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. F. Gillespie, Mr. C. Smith

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk) and one parishioner (Public Participation part of the meeting) and Mr. G. Bambridge (District Councillor)

Public Participation

A parishioner raised concerns regarding work being carried out in Millennium Wood which involved the removal of secondary fencing and some trees, shrubs and bushes. Mr. Sowinski gave a full explanation of plans for the Wood and a reassurance that all action is being taken following the receipt of professional guidance and advice for the benefit of the area.

Updated Information and Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Mr. Gee reported that a picnic table with seats had been vandalised, and another one is badly damaged. Two new replacements would cost about £700 and it was agreed to buy one for Millennium Wood as well. The total cost for the three will be in the region of £1K. Proposed by Mr. Gee and seconded by Mr. Phillips. All in favour. The camel (former piece of play equipment) is to make a return and will need a concrete pad.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble said that it is time for the grass banks to be mowed again.

Cathedral Meadows: The gate near the sheep field was broken and has been repaired by Mr. Sowinski.

Broom Green: Mr. Markwell had received a communication from a resident in Broom Green who is having discussions with the owner of the land. These appear to involve certain payments by the occupants of some tenanted properties. It is also believed that the pond needs to be dug out again. In addition, the footpath between Broom Green and the nearby farm is in poor condition. It is believed that the Parish Council has no involvement with the ownership of any of the land and the residents, therefore, need to talk to the landowner.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood): Mr. Sowinski has done some excellent work, and great progress has been made. There has been some very positive feedback from residents. Two signs have been erected by a parishioner who is thanked for this generous gesture.

Allotments

Notice has been given to one allotment holder who has not paid the annual rent. In addition, an unauthorised willow plantation is being grown.

Highway Matters

The footpath in Cathedral Drive is uneven and a man in a wheelchair tipped over on it and broke his hip. The matter was reported to Mr. Bill Borrett, District Councillor, and will also be drawn to the attention of Highways.

The Chairman has obtained an alternative quotation for the village gates which are being provided under the Parish Partnership scheme. This is for £6,222.67 + VAT to receive and install. The original amount envisaged was £15,668.

Rob Pratt of Norfolk County Council has confirmed that the location of the

current temporary bus stop next to the County School Station on the B1110 is not considered safe. The stop was installed by Konectbus and NCC holds no responsibility or liability for the use. He will be writing to the operator to request the removal of any signage indicating a formal bus stop.

Pavilion and Playing Field

It has been suggested that CCTV camera coverage near the tennis courts and connected to the facility at the pavilion should be considered. Vandalism in the area has occurred recently. A solution for the Village Green is also needed and quotations are to be obtained for both. The RoSPA reports have been received digitally, and hard copies are to be requested.

North Elmham Netball Club is holding a family night on 14th July at the tennis courts and has asked for permission to park cars on the adjoining football pitch. This, unfortunately, is not possible as vehicles are not normally allowed past the gate and the request has been turned down. Proposed by Mr. Rayner and seconded by Mr. Markwell. All in favour. The question has also been asked as to whether the Parish Council could provide funding. There are currently no budgeted funds for this. The Chairman will speak to the Netball Club's representative to explain the position.

The contract with E-on Next to provide electricity for the Pavilion ends on 5th August, 2025. Doing nothing and allowing a flexible business tariff to commence will substantially increase the current costs to £1,829.69. Fixed business plans for one year, two years and three years have been offered. It was agreed by all to select a plan for three years with an annual estimated cost of £1,106.23.

Duncan Partridge of Breckland Council has offered to provide a quotation for the trade waste collection service and is confident that a significant saving can be made. He wishes to inspect the facility as there appears to have been a significant increase in the weight of the waste received in recent times. A convenient date will be arranged.

Brookside Development Update

The legal documents have been signed so the installation of the fence and gate at school, can now proceed. The keys of the gate have been delivered to the school. It has been proposed that a nominal value of £1 be placed on the land (car park). All in favour.

Defibrillators

More volunteers are needed.

Local Plan Update

Mr. Rayner co-ordinated a response which was sent to Breckland Council with a copy being placed in Elmham News.

North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group

Mr. Fitzalan Howard is to discuss matters with the Group.

New Village Hall

A visit has been made to the Marshland Hall and Tea Room, and a similar viewing of Lyng Village Hall is to take place next week. Mr. Sowinski is to make the arrangements. Mr. Markwell is to facilitate valuations for both the Eastgate Centre and Memorial Hall.

North Elmham Football Club Facilities

The sum of £1.5K has been paid to Stalham Town Football Club for the referee's hut. The invoice is initially to be paid by the Parish Council with half of the cost (£750) being repaid by the Football Club at the rate of £75 per month. The first payment has been received. In addition, the monthly payment of £75 has also been received in respect of the ongoing hire of facilities.

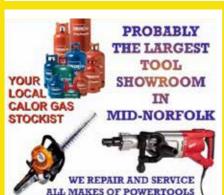

NORTH ELMHAM PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

WEDNESDAY 6TH AUGUST

Councillors Present Were: Mr. P. Grainger (Chairman), Mr. M. Phillips (Vice Chairman), Miss A. Ferris, Mr. T. Fitzalan Howard, Mr. B. Gee, Mr. F. Gillespie, Mrs. A. Keeble, Mr. N. Markwell and Mr. M. Rayner.

Also in Attendance: Mr. K. Webb (Clerk) and two parishioners (one parishioner remained after the Public Participation part of the meeting).

Apologies for Absence: Mr. C. Smith, Mr. J. Sowinski and Mr. G. Bambridge (District Cllr)

Public Participation

The Chair of the local branch of the Royal British Legion asked for financial assistance with the celebrations for VJ (Victory over Japan) Day on Saturday, 23rd August in the Memorial Hall. There will be live music from 2.30 p.m. until 4.30 p.m. with sandwiches and cakes provided. The cost of the band producing the music is £100. Tickets are £5 (children no charge).

It is anticipated that approximately 35 tickets will be sold. It was agreed that negotiations would be held with the band by the RBL to establish if they would attend for free as it is a national event and the Memorial Hall is a charity. On this basis, Mrs. Keeble proposed a donation of £100, as long as the band did not pass on a charge. This was seconded by Mr. Gillespie. All in favour.

Updated Information And Matters Arising

Land Management Matters

Village Green: Mr. Gee reported that three picnic tables with seats had been received. They have to be assembled. Concrete bases are to be put down for the two to be situated on the Village Green, as well as the returning and much awaited camel. The Clerk passed hard copies of

the RoSPA reports to Mr. Phillips who is currently attempting to locate a supplier of skatelite boards.

Cathedral Ruins: Mrs. Keeble had recently had a meeting with Mr. Duffield who is keeping the walkways in good order. Hardy Landscape has been asked to visit to cut the banks. A bill has not yet been received for last year's work.

Millennium Wood (and Jubilee Wood): Mr. Sowinski and his two helpers have done some fantastic work and this was acknowledged by all. An item is to be placed in Elmham News. The hire of the chipper is required for a further period in September at a cost of £180.

Allotments

The allotment holder who was asked to leave has gone. The water leak has been fixed.

Street Lights

Notification has been received from Drax that the fixed period for the unmetered supply of electricity to the street lights ends on 22nd September, 2025. Doing nothing will result in the variable rate applying and will mean an increase in the rate from 25.460 p/kWh to 31.500 p/kWh. We have found in the recent past that providers of electricity are extremely reluctant to accept this type of business so it was agreed by all to attempt to obtain another fixed contract with Drax.

Highway Matters

The Chairman has obtained an alternative quotation for the village gates which are being provided under the Parish Partnership scheme. This is for £6,222.67 + VAT to receive and instal. The original amount envisaged was £15,668. To date, no response has been received from the County Council so the Chairman will chase Matt Lines from Highways Department.

which is blocking the pavement and forcing pedestrians to walk in the road.

The Parish Council has been asked to draw this matter to the home owners' attention. If the matter is not resolved within 28 days, the County Council will arrange for contractors to do the necessary work and invoice the home owner for the cost involved. Mr. Gillespie has volunteered to speak to the resident responsible for the hedge.

Pavilion and Playing Field

Mr. Phillips reported that the basketball net has been cut. A replacement will be purchased. No response has been received from the person who was asked to provide quotations for additional CCTV so the company responsible for providing CCTV at Lyng Village Hall will be approached.

Active consideration is being given to transferring the management of the trade waste bin from Biffa to Breckland Council for a number of reasons which include cost and quality of the bin. The facility has recently been widely abused with a whole range of items ranging from industrial rubble to household waste being regularly deposited. Clear CCTV images of some of the offenders responsible are available and these are to be passed to Breckland Council for possible further action.

Duncan Partridge, Breckland Council, is to visit within the next few days to inspect the bin and offer any suggestions for improvement.

A children's party is to be held by the Football Club on 10th August.

Eastgate Centre

Mr. Fitzalan Howard said that a refund of £3,184 had been received from Anglian Water in respect of the overcharge which actually related to adjoining properties. There has been more vandalism. It was clear who was responsible and the CCTV evidence has been given to the police. The incident involved three children throwing

stones at a property in Spencer's Close and subsequently "celebrating" when their actions resulted in smashed windows.

Brookside Development Update

The Chairman has the keys to the meter at the electricity sub-station and suggested that it could be a good idea to purchase a cabinet in which this key and a number of others may be kept. This would be sited on a wall in the pavilion.

A letter has been received from E-on Next giving proposed supply and tariff details for the new EV charging points. The estimated annual cost is £1,693.90 based on a usage of 2,700 kWh of electricity. The Clerk will speak to the potential supplier.

Mr. Markwell is to produce information providing precise details of the exact position required for the new dog waste bin. This will then be passed to Breckland Council and Serco who will have to visit again to ensure that the location meets their requirements.

Defibrillators

Miss Ferris reported that the defibrillator at the Surgery is not working and it may well mean that a new battery is required. Mr. Fitzalan Howard offered to take Miss Ferris to the site to check. The defibrillator at the Pavilion remains in good working order.

Local Plan Update

Mr. Rayner said that Breckland Council hasn't yet decided how many new houses are to be allocated. The current three tiers system for villages is to be increased to four tiers, with North Elmham being in the top tier.

North Elmham Living Sustainably (NELS) Group

Mr. Fitzalan Howard has replied to the Group who have identified 16 locations, most of which are privately owned and the responsibility of individual landowners. There are some areas of parish and church

land included, and it has been stressed that the Parish Council only has limited funds available. In principle, information can be given regarding schemes in which the Parish has involvement, but other details will have to be sought from appropriate private landowners.

New Village Hall

An interesting and useful visit was made to Lyng Village Hall where the Chairman of the Parish Council, Steve Davis, gave valuable information regarding the experience of creating a new village facility.

The Future of the Churchyard

A query has been received from a parishioner regarding the right to access the Churchyard via the farm track. A copy of the Caution Property Register has been obtained by Mr. Fitzalan Howard and this confirms that St. Mary's Church has exercised a right of way to and from St. Mary's Church and to the new Churchyard for over 90 years. This right of way has been exercised both with and without vehicles, at all times and for all purposes. A copy of the Land Registry entry will be passed to the enquirer.

North Elmham Football Club Facilities

As agreed, funds continue to be received. Training for the new season has commenced.

Reports from County and District Councillors

Reports have been submitted by County and District members, and these can be viewed on the website.

Parish Clerk Matters

The Clerk has suffered a number of major computer problems over the past few weeks. Excellent support has been provided by Andrew Simnor, a local I.T. specialist based in Fakenham. A recommendation has been made by him as follows:-

- (i) An upgrade to Windows 11 (from Windows 10). The effective end of life for Windows 10 is mid-October, 2025 when support will no longer be available.
- (ii) The present desktop computer is more than ten years old and needs to be replaced. The total cost to achieve this is £1,010, of which North Elmham P.C. has been asked to provide £600. Acceptance of the above was proposed by Mr. Gillespie and seconded by Mr. Gee. All in favour.

The Clerk advised that the annual pay settlement, due on 1st April, 2025, has now been agreed with a percentage increase of 3.20% and a recommendation for immediate implementation. Back pay from 1st April, 2025 has to be included. All in favour.

IT'S THE LITTLE THINGS

Climate change, plastics, chemical use, tackling food waste, fast fashion, recycling, reducing consumption, driving less... the things that could be changed to live more sustainably can seem overwhelming. The approach that I've been taking recently is

to think a bit about the sustainable things that matter most to me and looking for ways to address those rather than trying to tackle everything.

Single use plastic and climate concerns are near the top of my own priority list and one thing I've been trying this year is switching from liquid shower gels, shampoo and conditioner to body bars (the toiletry formerly known as soap) and solid hair care products. When you buy liquid shower gels and hair care products most of it is expensive water, the weight of which adds significantly to the carbon cost of transportation. The plastic containers can be recycled, but most of them aren't and there is an environmental cost to both recycling and producing the plastic in the first place.

When you change any type of toiletry it can take a while to find one you like. With the 'body bar' that was relatively easy. Soap is widely available in shops there's lots of choice, and often cheaper than the shower gel I was using. Shampoo bars were a different challenge. The supermarket we use only had one variety that I didn't like very much so I went looking on-line where there are quite a few options. The main difference I found with many of them is that they didn't lather up like the liquid shampoos – but I have found one I like. It comes wrapped in tissue paper in a cardboard box that we can reuse or recycle.

Like everything there are pros and cons of change. The shampoo I like is from an online brand (NOPE) so I do need to think ahead a bit more to get it delivered. Its good not to have bulky plastic bottles on the side of the bath but there are soap dishes instead. When I travel I won't have to worry about the liquid allowances in my luggage or shampoo leaking over everything. The initial cost of the shampoo bars is higher than the shampoo I was using but they last a really long time and the soap is much cheaper so its swings and roundabouts.

ELMHAM WILDLIFE





Going back a few years
I remember Harlequin
Ladybirds being talked
about. They were an Asian beetle that
had been deliberately introduced to North
America and Continental Europe to act
as a biological control agent to manage
aphid populations on crops. It was hoped
that their voracious appetite for crop
pests would lead to improved yields. They
have indeed reduced some crop pests in
America, such as Soybean Aphids which
were themselves introduced from China,
but they have also had a negative impact
on various other native insects.



They were being talked about here because it was expected that they would soon make it over to the UK from the near Continent. Their arrival was considered inevitable, and it was feared that when they came they might wipe out our native ladybird species like the very familiar and popular 7-spot Ladybird (photo 1). Sure enough, in 2004, Harlequin Ladybirds were indeed found in the UK for the first time, in Essex.



Ladybirds fly easily and disperse readily (often aided by humans – I'm sure we've all found them hitching a ride on us) and with Harlequins not being very fussy about their habitat, it had been predicted that once they arrived they would spread rapidly throughout the UK. This proved to be the case and in just two years they were becoming common in Norfolk. It was 2006 that I encountered my first, at my then-home in Bawdeswell.

It had been thought that climate change would aid their spread, and this also proved true as we've seen that although









they quickly reached even the north of Scotland, they didn't establish in the cooler parts of the country in nearly such large numbers. In other hotter countries they have a period of dormancy in the summer, but it was predicted that with our maritime climate it would still be cool enough here for them to produce multiple generations through the summer, and that this would help them establish here even more quickly. Again that prediction turned out to be right as well.

I still see slightly more 7-spot Ladybirds than Harlequin Ladybirds on the whole, but I think Harlequin is now comfortably one of the two commonest ladybirds here now. I'm glad to say the one prediction that hasn't come to pass yet is that they would wipe out our native 7-spot Ladybirds. They have had a negative impact on their population size though, and I'm told their impact on the diminutive 2-spot Ladybirds (photo 2) is more significant. Indeed it has been shown that most other species of ladybird have declined fastest in areas with the largest populations of Harlequins. They've also impacted aphids (both pest and non-pest species) but with some of the other aphid-eating insects in decline many aphids have still managed to have a bumper year this year. Harlequins have been recorded predating moth eggs and larvae and feeding on a range of other insects, so their presence here is certainly not helping with the general insect declines that we are experiencing. Nevertheless, they are here to stay – it is impossible to eradicate a successful insect like this.

Harlequin Ladybirds are relatively large ladybirds, and quite variable in their appearance. One common form is fairly similar to 7-spot Ladybirds except with



many more spots and a different face pattern (photo 3). Others are similar but with a paler orange background (photo 4). Sometimes they're missing most of their spots, or the spots are faint (photo 5). A totally different form can also be found – black with a pair of large red spots (photo 6). More commonly they are similar to this but with an extra pair of smaller red spots towards the rear of the wing cases (photo 7).

Harlequin Ladybird larvae are easy to spot and can be found on a wide variety of plants. They are dark greyish spiky larvae with pairs of orange spots on five consecutive body segments and a smaller pair of orange spikes in the middle of two segments (photo 8). 7-spot Ladybird larvae are similar but have less orange – just two pairs of small orange spots on these body segments.

Like many other insects, the larvae pupate once they've finished feeding. The pupae are orangey-red with black spots (photo 9). 7-spot Ladybird pupae are quite similar, more orange and with smaller black spots. Once they have developed inside their pupal cases, the adults emerge. When the adults first come out it takes a few hours for their colours to develop – if you find one just after it has emerged ("teneral") it will be paler than normal and lack its spots even if it's going to become one of the spotted types.

When there's been a particularly large emergence of Harlequins and they're trying to disperse, you can encounter swarms of them. On a couple of occasions I've found scores of them on the windows and sides of the house. You'll also find them at windows when they're trying to find somewhere to hibernate – they're looking for sheltered





nooks and crannies, but inside your property is even better!

What's your experience with ladybirds? Have you noticed changes in the species you encounter, or a reduction in numbers of our native species? Do let me know. I always appreciate hearing from you about the wildlife you've seen so please keep the reports coming. SINKING OF THE TITANTIC

If you are new to Elmham, you may not have heard of Watts Naval Training School. It was home for 300 boys who lived there at the end of the County School driveway. It was a Barnardo's home for destitute boys. Many of those boys went on to join the Royal Navy or the Merchant Navy. This is the story of Fred Humby.

On the evening of 9th April, 1912, an old boy from Watts Naval Training School, Fred Humby, spent the evening with his old instructor, Mr Hodge, and a fellow Old Boy, 'little Harry Woods' as they celebrated his new job. Previously, he had worked on the SS Hildebrand and got a prestigious job on this new fantastic liner, the Titanic... the most luxurious of its kind ever. The ship was to sail across the Atlantic carrying some of the world's richest and most famous people to New York on its Maiden Voyage.

Fred was to become a pantry man or steward (I suppose he was a very lowly steward in the pecking order) on this ship, the largest liner in the world, which would sink three days later when it hit an iceberg, causing one of the most notorious and memorable tragedies, in naval history. Altogether 1,600 lives were lost.

Fred Humby and his younger brother Frank both spent time at Watts Naval Training School here on the edge of Elmham. As the annual report of the time explains, Frederick was not quite up to physical standards for the Royal Navy, so instead he became a merchant seaman. This contrasted with his brother Frank, who passed with flying colours and was the first boy at Watts to receive a £25 gratuity. This was awarded to boys who earned sufficient marks to be graded first class in schooling, seamanship and gunnery.

After Fred's death, Watts launched a Memorial Fund to raise money for a stained glass window to be erected at the chapel in the young seaman's memory.

Sufficient money was raised, and the window was created and installed in Watts Naval School chapel with the inscription at its base 'to the glory of God and in memory of Frederick Humby, a boy hero, who perished on board the SS Titanic-15th April 1912, aged 17 years.

Very sadly after the school closed as a Barnados home in 1954, the main building was demolished and the Memorial window went missing. Years later it was bought at auction in Texas and we know the family who have the window, researched it and know Fred Humby's story. As long as that window is around everyone will remember that young man's name.

TOWNSEND'S ELMHAM PART TWO

The years following the First World War saw many changes in Elmham. The loss of 34 young men on the battlefields of Europe would have left a huge gap in village society. Gradually soldiers and prisoners-of-war began returning home, many of whom would never recover from the horrors of the Front. Services were held giving thanksgiving for the end of the war and in August 1919, a dinner was given at the Kings Head by the Demobilised Soldiers' and Sailors' Federation. Some of those who did return were either too traumatized to take part in village life or had seen something of a world beyond rural Norfolk, and moved on. The population of the village continued to decline. 1919 saw the sale of the Elmham estate which has been owned by the same family (the Milles, later Lord and then Earl Sondes) from the early 18th century. This was a time when the pattern of land ownership across the country changed dramatically as owners tried to take advantage of the higher land prices resulting from higher food prices during the war.

Landowners feared that the return of peace would mean food imports would increase and agriculture would enter a depression again. Many of the Elmham farms were bought by their tenants whose families had long been farming in the village. The timber was sold off the Park and the house stripped of anything that could be sold and left derelict for several years.

At a local level, meetings were held to decide the best way of commemorating the dead and the establishment of a 'Village Institute' was suggested by the Revd Townsend and decided upon. In January 1920 a brass memorial tablet to commemorate the dead was unveiled in the church. In December, as a temporary measure, an army hut was moved from Mattishall and erected on the present Institute site. In February 1920 the first meeting in the hut took place and a

management committee set up. Eight of the twelve were ex-servicemen. The village doctor, Dr Rackham was an active member, and Townsend was the chair. The recently formed Women's Institute was involved in fundraising for the furniture and a small billiard table purchased. In 1928 the first stage of building was finished and a full-sized billiard table installed. The completed hall was opened in 1930 and in 1933 Elmham became a member of the local billiards league.

A general feeling of unease was detected in the country. The revolution in Russia and the growth of radical politics at home was a concern. In May 1921 a 'Day of Prayer for the nation' was declared 'that the widespread spirit of unrest in political, commercial and social life might be replaced by a better spirit'.

Many things, however, continued much as before the war: ploughing matches were reported on and news from the Cricket Club and the Horticultural Society continued to be included in the Parish Magazine. 1922 was a bumper year for the Horticultural Show. 1,200 people paid for admission, while 200 came on bicycles. There were sports and country dancing and the band from Watts Naval College at County School performed. A Tennis Club was first mentioned in 1920 and a football club in 1929.

The number of lectures (many illustrated with 'lantern slides') and other activities in the village increased in the 1920s making use of both the school room and later the Institute. Work of the missionary societies extolling the 'heroism and adventures' of the work was a frequent lecture subject. The films of the Selbourne Society about bird and animal life were also popular. In 1928, Townsend gave a lecture on 'Elmham 100 years ago' and his articles on the history of Elmham in the magazine became more frequent. From 1922 the Institute was used for a 'village drama' and Christmas party. Every year the Revd. Townend had a month's holiday, and a locum vicar took over the vicarage. When

he Returned, he frequently gave a lecture about the places he visited such as Jersey, Wales, Gibraltar and France.

Although the Old-age Pension had been introduced before the war, the National Health Service was a long way in the future and various self-help schemes were in operation. In 1922 a 'North Elmham Hospital Contributory Fund' was set up with a small weekly contribution of two and a half pence. By 1928 the scheme had 434 contributors (about half of the total population). Seventeen patients had received hospital treatment in the previous year at the Norfolk and Norwich and 20 at the Jenny Lind. An Elmham and District Nursing Association is mentioned in 1931. In 1927 a Red Cross Ambulance was purchased by Dereham, to which the Hospital Contributory Fund had contributed. A strange request from Dereham hospital reached Elmham. The Hospital was very short of eggs and for many years eggs were provided from Elmham.

A small notice in the parish magazine in March 1924 gives an insight into a village community which came to the help of one of its number when in trouble. A notice from 'Mr T. Pierce of Spong Farm (stated that he) wishes to convey his grateful thanks to all those who generously came forward to help him meet his recent loss of both his horses'.

The County Council had been set up in 1888 and Rural Districts (RDCs) and Parish Councils in 1894. Gradually they took over responsibilities for matters such as public health and housing. Lectures, particularly of interest to those renting the increasing number of County Council smallholdings included such topics as poultry keeping and milk production. The County Library was founded in 1921 with a centre in Elmham opened in 1926 with 120 members. It was run by volunteers and was open twice a week for an hour. Every four months a new supply of books arrived by motor van. The County Library, the school circulating library and the

erection of the Institute made the Reading Room redundant. The membership fell and the Wilson family who had continued to support it, agreed that it no longer filled a need, and it finally closed at the end of December 1931.

A major development was the building of council houses by the new Mitford and Launditch Rural District Council. From 1890 local councils could apply for funding to build houses, but it was not until after 1918 that much action was taken. In June 1919 the Mitford and Launditch RDC sent out questionnaires to parishes within its area. North Elmham replied that 75% of the cottages within the parish required repair although there was no family in need of accommodation.

In 1929 five pairs of substantial threebedroom houses were built by the RDC on the Dereham Road opposite the playing field and in 1933 four more on the Broom Green Road and were a great improvement on most of the overcrowded cottage accommodation in the village.

ST MARY'S CHURCH

We are due a Harvest Moon on 6th October. It's the full moon closest to the Autumn equinox (22nd September), when the length of days and nights are the same. The Harvest Moon is so-called because the bright, fuller phases of the Moon appear at approximately the same time each evening, and the abundance of bright early-evening moon-light on consecutive days lit the fields for collecting the harvest.

It conjures up images of harvests long ago, with gangs of men working the land, supported by women and children helping out and bringing food and drink to sustain them. It's a very different story now, of course, with combines doing a lot of the heavy work, although it still means long days for our farmers and agricultural workers.

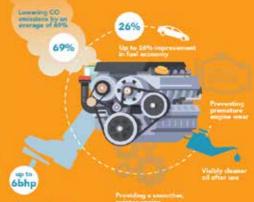
